INCREASE OF ANCHOR LINE FLEET. CONSTRUCTION OF TWO OF FOUR NEW STEAMERS FOR NEW-YORK AND GLASGOW AND MEDITERRANEAN PORTS BEGUN.

Further details of the new ships which it was reported a few days ago are to be built by the Anchor Line were made public yesterday.

Columbia will be laid next month. She will be of 850 tons gross, and 485 feet on the load water line, and have three funnels. She will have accommodations for 216 first class, 364 second class and 700 stowage passengers.
