

WILL NOT RELEASE FEIGENBAUM.

Justice Blanchard in the Supreme Court yesterday dismissed a writ of habeas corpus obtained by a friend of Louis I. Feigenbaum for the release of the latter from the Manhattan State Asylum, to which he had been committed from the insane pavilion at Bellevue Hospital, after an examination as to his sanity by Drs. Allen Fitch and H. Valentine Whitman.

DR. FLOYD AND ROOSEVELT HOSPITAL.

DR. SHRADY COMMENTS SHARPLY ON THE HOUSE PHYSICIAN'S DISMISSAL.

The case of Dr. Rolfe Floyd, who was obliged physician at Roosevelt Hospital, and was obliged to resign on account of action by the Board of Trustees on November 23, is causing discussion in the medical profession and has been asserted by Dr. Shrady that he was treated with harshness and injustice, as his term of service at the hospital would have ended on December 31, when he would have received his hospital diploma.

It has been asserted that Dr. Floyd was obliged to resign on account of the complaint of Dr. James W. McLane, dean of the Roosevelt Hospital, and Surgeon-in-Chief of the hospital.

The explanation of Dr. McLane's complaint it is asserted that Dr. McLane arranged to have a servant in the employ of Mrs. Cornelius N. Bliss admitted to the hospital, and that when the servant was taken to the hospital she was obliged to work for half an hour before Dr. George F. Shrady, and in a article in "The Medical Record," makes the following comment on the case:

The result of the deliberations of the elderly men who manage this important charitable institution was that the house physician at service, and requested to leave the hospital at the earliest possible moment. For an entirely unprofessional man of unblemished character and of the education has been dismissed from his hospital service as though he had committed crime.

Dr. McLane and trustees of the hospital have refused to make any statements to representatives of the newspapers regarding the case of Dr. Floyd. W. Emlen Roosevelt, the secretary of the Board of Trustees, said yesterday to a Tribune reporter:

It was agreed among the trustees that nothing is to be said by us about the case. We understand the case, but so long as it is understood that only one side is given we are satisfied. We are making no reply to the criticism in the case.
