

SIGHTED DISTRESSED STEAMER.

Another standing by—neither answered Brooklyn City's signal. The British steamer Brooklyn City, which arrived here yesterday from a slow voyage, reported that on Sunday, December 16, when in latitude 42° 30' north and 73° 30' west, a distressed steamer was sighted with another steamer standing by. The distressed steamer was in ballast, and had a yellow funnel with black top; the white bands and black top of the funnel were visible. The captain of the distressed vessel appeared to be a man of the Brooklyn City. He said that it was his belief that the distressed steamer had been in tow of the other steamer, but that owing to high seas and heavy winds the hawser had parted. He signalled to the vessel, asking their names and whether they needed any assistance. These were not answered for some reason. It was thought by the officers of the Brooklyn City that the vessel was making for Queenstown.

AMASA THORNTON'S MARRIAGE.

Amasa Thornton, the well known politician, whose first wife died about four years ago, married again on Saturday evening. His bride was Miss Emma Steinmetz, of No. 29 Bay Thirty-third street, Brooklyn. She obtained a divorce from her former husband, who is in the Klondike, a week ago. The wedding ceremony took place in an ante-room of St. James's Methodist Episcopal Church, Bensonhurst, while a Christmas entertainment was in progress. About 8 o'clock when Mr. Thornton and Mrs. Steinmetz arrived at the church door in a carriage. They called on the Rev. A. H. Rennie and said they wanted to be married at once. The minister at first declined, saying that the children were waiting inside for him. Mr. Thornton explained that he had driven all over Bensonhurst without finding another minister, and Mr. Rennie consented to perform the ceremony. After the ceremony the couple drove away without waiting to receive congratulations and went to Mrs. Thornton's home, Bay Thirty-third street. Amasa Thornton is a native of New York City, but for some time has made his home at Bensonhurst. He is well known as a Republican politician, and for some time was the representative on the State Committee from the Thirtieth Congressional District.

"EL TIEMPO" AND M'KINLEY'S ELECTION.

There are many newspapers in Spanish America named "El Tiempo" ("The Times"). The one referred to above is the ancient paper at Lima, Peru, which is at the same time very popular and the semi-official organ of the Government. In one of its latest numbers at hand, bearing the date of December 3, 1900, "El Tiempo" published a "New York Letter" in which the correspondent in this city, written on November 8, after the President's election, and it indorses the pro-American ideas of the correspondent, Señor Francisco Garcia Cisneros. The press writers in Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil and Peru have generally congratulated the United States upon the result of the election, but none in such an enthusiastic language as that used in the following extracts from "El Tiempo": "Because of the prosperity of the Nation and of its great industries, William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt—both candidates presented by the Republic—have been elected for the term of four years. During that time the President will be able to insure the use of the gold standard in the payments of the National Treasury, to increase the honor of the country, to sustain the Navy and the Army and give an impetus to all things, principally to public education, agriculture and industry. They will, in everything, the programme imposed by the disingenuous Republican party, without forgetting the promise to concede absolutely to the Republic of Cuba, and to give to Porto Rico the rights of a Territory. The money of the Democrats—more

than 50,000,000 pesos—and the incessant oratorical work of the indefatigable Bryan were of no use before the sympathy and enthusiasm of the Republican ticket displayed in the States of the East and the Northeast, like Ohio, Maine, Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Connecticut, in New York.

CLEVELAND SUIT INVOLVING MILLIONS.

CLAIMS TO ESTATE OF LEONARD CASE INVOLVE MANY PURCHASERS OF PROPERTY. Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 29.—A suit involving the ownership of many millions of dollars' worth of property in this city and for \$1,500,000 damages for being excluded from the rents and profits of the same, was begun to-day by claimants to the estate of Leonard Case, who died in 1880. The defendants in the suit are about five hundred in number, being all persons who have taken possession of the property formerly belonging to Leonard Case, to whom it has been sold by his heirs. The plaintiffs, nine in number, allege they are the rightful heirs to the property. Two of the claimants, Joel and Waters Cummings, declare they are sons of Mr. Case's sister. The basis of the claims is that cousins cannot become heirs to property which a sister's estate having largely been left to cousins of the dead man.

MRS. J. R. KIMBALL'S ANNUAL DINNER.

Mrs. J. R. Kimball yesterday fed 250 poor persons in the basement of the City Hall. Mrs. Kimball has been following this charity for several years. Heretofore the entire meal has been served at the City Hall. This year, however, only coffee, ice cream and cake were served. The guests received baskets of uncooked food to take home. The basement of the City Hall was decorated with holly and greens, and draped with colored bunting.
