BIG TOBACCO DEAL REMOVED.

REARRESTED ON LEAVING PRISON.
FORMER SING SING PRISONER CHARGED
WITH MURDER IN NEW-JERSEY.
Charles Collins, who was sentenced at Pough-
keepsie on February 8, 1897, to five years in Sing
Sing Prison for a burglary committed in Dutchess
County, N. J., which had never been immedi-
ately rearrested by two New-Jersey detectives,
Daniel McNally and John Ciancio, who had acqui-
sition papers signed by Governor Odell. He is
charged with shooting Conductor Abram L. Smith,
of the Pennsylvania Railroad. Collins denied that
he shot Conductor Smith, and he had never been
in New-Jersey and that he could prove an alibi.
The detectives brought Collins before County
Judge Lent, at White Plains. They told him that
Judge Lent was positive that Collins was the man
wanted, and said that he was known to the police
of New-Jersey as "Thirty-five Mile Hill." They
alleged that he belonged to a gang of crooks in
dressed men, and then placed the man in the rail-
road tracks for the purpose of destroying all trace
of him from it. No boys were present, as the
school was closed for the holidays.
