A WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION.

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Paris, Feb. 23.—Washington's Birthday was celebrated last night by a banquet given by the American University Club, at which General Horace Porter presided and at which more than fifty graduates of American colleges were present.

THE NEWS FROM MANILA.

PROTECTING GOLD FIELDS—TEN DOLLARS EACH FOR HEADS OF AMERICANS.

Manila, Feb. 23.—Commissioner Worcester is preparing a bill for submission to the Commission permitting the leasing of land until a government shall have been established which will have authority to alienate the lands for mining claims.

Thousands of men are at work upon the Government wagon road between Dagupan and Baguio, the capital of the Benguet Province, which is being constructed at a fractional part of the cost estimated by army engineers.

The records of temperature at Baguio for December and January show the weather to have been remarkably cool and salubrious. A health resort for soldiers and civilians is soon to be established there.

The 35d Infantry will sail on the transport Logan on Monday stopping at Vigan, to take companies C, E and M, which have been detained at Ilocos by smallpox, provided the quarantine is raised.

The Government buildings at Iba, capital of Zambales Province, have been burned. The jail alone escaping the flames. The 24th Infantry's supplies were destroyed by the fire.

A detachment of the 4th Infantry has captured General Vinezca, near Cavite Viejo. General Callies has issued a proclamation offering \$10 (Mexican) each to the heads of Americans.

London, Feb. 23.—King Edward boarded a train at Charing Cross Station at 10 o'clock to-night for Port Victoria, where he will embark on the royal yacht Victoria and Albert for Flushing, en route for Cronberg, whither he goes to pay a visit to the Empress Dowager Frederick.

Though the drive from Marlborough House to the station was made without an escort, the route was lined with people who cheered vociferously. For the first time since the accession of the King His Majesty seemed himself again, bowing and smiling on every side.

The money rate depends to some degree on the Bank of England's control of the market. It will probably maintain its firmness next week, when the supply of money for the week will be reduced by heavy tax payments.

London, Feb. 23.—On the Stock Exchange, apart from Saturday's ordinary disposition to do business, the rumor that De Wet and Botha had been captured caused much noise among Kaffirs temporarily.

Shanghai, Feb. 23.—The latest edict of the Chinese Court expresses the desire that Chi Hsin and Hsu Chen Yu, now in the hands of the Powers, be handed over for immediate execution.

Chicago, Feb. 23.—The Chronicle will announce to-morrow that Mrs. Emma Blaine of this city has turned over to Chicago University the Chicago Institute of Pedagogy, which will represent an addition to the University endowment of nearly \$2,000,000.

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SIR ROBERT HART'S PROTEST.

SAYS SOME OF THE POWERS HAVE GRABBED HIS PRIVATE PROPERTY IN PEKING.

Peking, Feb. 23.—Sir Robert Hart, Chief of the Chinese Imperial Customs, has sent the Ministers of the Powers a strongly worded letter of protest against the seizure of his property to increase the size of the legations' area, which has been taken by Austria, France, Germany and Italy.

He says it can only be considered Chinese Government property in an indefinite sense, in that during the last twenty years part of his salary as a Peking official has been given to him in houses instead of the Government paying in cash. Sir Robert also put money into the purchase of land, in building houses and in keeping them in repair.

General Yamaguchi, the Japanese commander, and General Chaffee have issued orders permitting visitors, properly accredited, to visit the legations on certain days, during certain hours, and that foreigners and their personal friends can visit the city at any time.

The principal topic, the Court's edict regarding punishments, discussed at yesterday's meeting of the Ministers and to-day's meeting, was short, owing to the Ministers awaiting the full text of the Chinese Court's last edicts, which were unofficially reported as absolutely satisfactory.

London, Feb. 23.—The Foreign Office, though satisfied with what it is pleased to consider the immediate result of Count von Waldersee's action, regards the Chinese backwardness with some suspicion.

Nothing except the vaguest tentative suggestions have been received by the British Government in regard to what is generally termed here "America's new note."

Washington, Feb. 23.—This Government has now received assurances from nearly all the Powers represented by military forces at Peking of their entire agreement with the United States Government as to the expediency of resuming offensive military operations in China while the peace negotiations are in progress.

Berlin, Feb. 23.—Official circles declare that the fears which are expressed in Washington that Germany's claims for indemnity against the Kaiser's excessive arrears of customs, amount has not yet been determined upon, but an examination of the claims is going on.

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WEIRD MONTANA TRAGEDY.

CAPTAIN DOTSON'S MURDER ASCRIBED TO A CONVICT BRIBED BY HIS SON.

Helena, Mont., Feb. 23.—The mystery surrounding the death of Captain Oliver Dotson, one of the men who laid out the city of Denver, and was a famous Black-hill character, whose dead body was found in his cabin in Washington Gulch, thirty-five miles west of Helena, remains unsolved, and the tragedy promises to develop one of the most remarkable stories of crime ever heard in this region.

Dotson in the confession says he was about to commit suicide, and that he made the confession in the hope of freeing innocent men. The officers believe the confession to be a clever forgery, but say they cannot prove this until persons familiar with Dotson's handwriting can be found.

Some time ago the Warden of the penitentiary learned that a convict who was released in December last had declared that he would kill Dotson if he would give him a hundred dollars.

The Financial World.

A short week of four days only, the Exchange having closed for the week Thursday afternoon, did not leave much time for developments; and as a matter of fact, the market was slow and dragging for three of the four days, with nothing much to it beyond very plain evidences of liquidation.

Yesterday the banks were open though the Exchange was not, and the bank statement came out at its usual hour. Had business been going on at the time, doubtless the statement would have given a little stimulus to prices, as it showed that the expansion of loans, which was beginning to create uneasiness, had been checked.

One of the incidents of the week was the buying of Burlington, and the flood of rumors in connection with it, to which the resignation of President Perkins gave color of truth. Concomitantly in St. Paul, one of the rumors was that Burlington stock was being bought in the interest of the Union Pacific.

Through it will not be through purchases of Burlington stock in the open market, but by private negotiation. It can be readily seen that information of these negotiations getting out—would be inevitable—those who got the information would be disposed to buy Burlington on the chances that the deal would go through.

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
