

MILLS IN SOUTH CAROLINA.

QUEEN MANUFACTURING STATE OF THE SOUTH—PEOPLE FIGURING IN MILLIONS.

Colombia, S. C., Feb. 24 (Special).—Some conservative persons expressed the fear more than a year ago that South Carolina might be "overdoing" the cotton manufacturing business. The progress...

But the idea of South Carolinians investing millions in manufacturing or anything else would five years ago have been considered chimerical. Yet for the year just past cotton mill building...

Charters were granted to thirty-one new mills in 1900, with an aggregate capital of \$4,500,000. The capital of twenty-one of those mills ranged from \$100,000 to \$900,000, fourteen of them being \$200,000 and upward.

It is notable that both in 1899 and 1900 the increase in the number of cotton mills was less than in any other year. In 1899, for example, there were in almost every instance made to build additional or entirely new mills adjoining the old ones.

Despite the fact that cotton has advanced and the manufacturers of some classes of coarse goods, the cotton crop in the States this year has been a prosperous one. Not many mills were affected by the strike in China.

GERMAN FOWLS DERELICT IN THEIR DUTY, SO THE KAISER SENT AN AGENT HERE.

Washington, Feb. 24.—Through unofficial sources the interesting fact has been learned here that Emperor William recently sent to this country a trusted agent to study carefully and report on the character and habits of the American hen, with the diet and habits which she perceives to conduce to her remarkable fecundity.

To give early demonstration of the truth of his contention, the Count carried back to the Kaiser's domain several scores of the finest specimens of American hens obtainable. He will cross the American breeds with the German stock, in the confident expectation of securing results that will prove the correctness of his theory, and at the same time he will entirely satisfy Emperor William that he will no longer have to despair of his soldiers and other faithful subjects being able to eat German instead of foreign eggs, which not only cost more, but are not so enjoyable to the German palate.
