Albert L. Johnson, the railroad contractor, created the impression before the Council Committee on Railroads yesterday afternoon that he was something of a fighter, considerable of a stump speaker and a magnificently busy man.

Shepard, counsel to the Rapid Transit Commission, as a self-obliteration and an enemy of the people's interests in connection with securing a rapid transit, ridiculed Alexander E.
