ENTER CITY'S TEMPESTUOUS VOYAGE.

ONE MAN LOST OVERBOARD, AND ST. ELMO'S FIRE SEEN THREE TIMES.

The steamer Exeter City, of the Bristol City Line, which arrived here yesterday from Bristol, England, experienced an unusual electrical storm and lost one man on the night on which it called "Jack Klondike" was either so frightened that he jumped overboard or else was washed off the decks by the waves that swept over the vessel.

The Exeter City left Bristol on March 11, passed Swansea on the 13th, and up to the 19th had model weather. She carried a cargo of merchandise consigned to this city. On that morning she encountered severe gales and a driving snowstorm, which continued with unabated force until March 23.

Shortly before midnight on March 20 comports lights, better known to mariners as St. Elmo's fire, appeared on the tips of the two masts and on the stays. Between 11 and 12 o'clock the lights appeared three times, each time preceding a heavy squall of wind and rain.
