
MRS. FREDERICK NATHAN ADDRESSES THE WOMAN'S NATIONAL SABBATH ALLIANCE.

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SPLIT UP TO EVADE THE LAW.

NAGLE'S DEPARTMENT GETS AROUND THE PROVISION LIMITING THE AWARD OF CONTRACTS WITHOUT ADVERTISING.

A striking illustration of how easy it is for the Tammanyized city government to get around the law requiring that all city contracts amounting to more than \$1,000 shall be publicly advertised is furnished in the report of disbursements in Commissioner Nagle's Department of Street Cleaning for the week ending March 10.

These separate items figure up just \$15,000. Deputy Commissioner Gibson of the Department of Street Cleaning, when asked for an explanation, said:

The city has to have a lot of outside help in carrying away ashes and street litter. Mr. Dalley has been doing work of this kind for years, and has ample facilities for doing it. He does it as cheap as any one, and does it well.

Some of the city officials assert that the towing concerns are on a par with the charges of companies like the Dalzell and Moran companies.

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TO EMPTY ALL PEDAGOGY CHAIRS.

NEW-YORK UNIVERSITY COUNCIL WILL REMOVE DEAN E. R. SHAW.

The executive committee of the Council of the University of New-York held a meeting yesterday afternoon at No. 32 Nassau-st., and took the preliminary step toward vacating all the chairs of the School of Pedagogy.

What has occurred that has not found its way to the newspapers, so far only three members of the faculty have resigned, but by the time the Council of the University meets, in two weeks, we will have control of every chair.

When asked whether the professors who had been asked for their resignations would be given a hearing before the Council, Chancellor MacCracken said:

They will have a full hearing, though probably not in person. They are at liberty to present their case by writing, but anything they may submit will receive full consideration.

NEW BRIDGE'S FIFTH CABLE PLACED. BECAUSE OF THE SAGGING OF FOOT BRIDGE SHAMROCK II MAY NOT BE ABLE TO PASS UNDER.

The fifth cable for the support of the working footbridges on the New East River Bridge was hoisted into place yesterday. The operation began at 12:30 p. m., when a heavy mast hung over the river, and was not concluded until nearly 1 o'clock.

ENTERTAINMENT IN AID OF SMALL GIRLS OF THE EAST SIDE TENEMENTS.

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PRIZE FOR A BOOKPLATE.

DESIGN BY MRS. ANNIE B. HOOPER ACCEPTED BY BUFFALO SOCIETY OF ARTISTS.

Mrs. Annie B. Hooper, of this city, has just received the prize offered by the Buffalo Society of Artists for the most attractive and appropriate bookplate design for the organization.

Although the earliest bookplates date back to the beginning of the sixteenth century, Albrecht Durer began to design some before they have been restricted until within comparatively few years to the real bibliophile.

There are numbers of conventional designs offered at the book stores, and it is also possible to order from that source special designs. There is a fancy for having the coat of arms worked into the design, but some persons who possess esoteric symbols still prefer to have their bookplates composed of other symbols.
