

IMPORTANT NEW LAWS.

MANY BILLS RECEIVE THE GOVERNOR'S APPROVAL.

Albany, April 29 (Special).—Governor Odell signed today the bill apportioning the Congress districts of the State and several other important bills.

One of the bills was the one sent here by the Rapid Transit Commissioners and introduced by Senator Stranahan, making clear the sections of the Rapid Transit act providing for the condemnation of land for the underground rapid transit road.

Another act approved was that concerning the punishment of directors of stock corporations who shall vote or issue a proxy to any person for a sum of money. Both offices are brought under the Penal Code. Senator Brackett introduced the bill.

The Governor also signed Assemblyman Remsen's bill for the improvement of Bedford-ave.

Mayor Van Wyck having approved of Assemblyman Morgan's bill enlarging the number of trustees of the consolidated libraries of New-York to twenty, Governor Odell saw no objection to it and signed it.

The judges of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the 112 Judicial District will be glad to learn that Governor Odell has signed Senator Miller's bill providing that their compensation, if they do not live in the district, shall be the same as the Supreme Court justices who do live in it.

One of the most important acts signed to-day was one presented by Senator Elsieberg, which repeals the law of 1896 providing for a special jury commissioner in the counties of New-York and Kings. The act says that "the office of each special commissioner of jurors is abolished and each of such special commissioners of jurors shall turn over to the commissioner of jurors of his county all books, papers and documents held by him as such special commissioner of jurors."

In another bill signed by the Governor provision is made by the commissioner of jurors the county clerk or his deputy, and one or more judges of a court of record, residing in the county of New-York, shall be the jury commissioners of that county.

Another act signed by the Governor which provides that within twenty days after the act takes effect the justices of the Appellate Division, both the First and Second Judicial districts shall appoint a commissioner of jurors. These then are to take the places of the present commissioners of jurors in the counties of New-York and Kings, and also of the special commissioners of jurors in these counties. Each commissioner is to receive a salary not exceeding \$6,000.

Other bills signed to-day were: Senator Hennessy's—Increasing from \$200,000 to \$250,000 the appropriation for a bridge over the Harlem River.

Senator Mills's—Providing that the salary of the county clerk of Westchester County be \$7,500.

Senator Marshall's—Extending until January, 1903, the time in which two-thirds of the capital stock of the State Bank and Trust Company shall be paid in.

Mr. Lewis's—Exempting from taxation the unearned premiums of fire, casualty and surety insurance companies.

Mr. Axtell's—Authorizing the State Board of Railroad Commissioners to extend the time in which a railroad company may complete its road.

TO CONTINUE THE RACETRACK FIGHT.

STEINHARDT BELIEVES THAT THE LAW IS BEING VIOLATED THERE.

Benjamin F. Steinhardt, of the law firm of Howe & Hummel, said yesterday that pressure was being brought to bear to make him give up the fight that he has begun against bookmaking on running tracks in this State. He says that so great has been this pressure that even Frank Farrell, who is considered to be one of Deputy Chief Devery's best friends, has said that he thinks it would be better to have his legal cases hereafter attended to by another lawyer. Mr. Steinhardt said yesterday that he was making this fight alone and for personal reasons. The men who are alleged to run bookrooms are not doing him any wrong.

It was said that he intended to go to Morris Park on the opening day and have the first bookmaker that he saw saying odds arrested. This report he says is untrue, but he would like to see the attention of Police Commissioner Murphy to the Percy-Gray law, and that he had learned that a Commissioner had referred the matter to the Corporation Counsel Whelan for his opinion. Mr. Steinhardt says he is anxiously awaiting Mr. Whelan's reply. His determination to continue the war against the tracks has somewhat ruffled the temper of Mr. Howe, and yesterday afternoon a considerable excitement and talk in the office of the firm.

TO BE SENTENCED FOR BOOKMAKING.

FIRST CONVICTION OF ITS KIND IN MANY YEARS IS THAT OF LEVY.

Benjamin Levy, alias Bernard Leroy, aged twenty-four years, a clerk, of No. 196 Third-st., Brooklyn, was yesterday afternoon convicted of bookmaking, before Recorder Goff, in Part I of General Sessions. He was remanded for sentence until Thursday. This is the first bookmaking conviction in this county in many years. Levy was arrested on January 29, 1900, by agents of the Society for the Prevention of Crime.

AN ALLEN-ST. WOMAN SENTENCED.

The examination of Alderman Frederick F. Fleck on the charge of keeping a disorderly music hall in the Bowery has been postponed until May 6.

Mrs. Hester Wolf, janitress of No. 102 Allen-st., was put on trial yesterday in Special Sessions on the charge of maintaining a disorderly place. Two detectives testified that they had been referred by the janitress to alleged disorderly women in the house, and men who said they were farmers and who were convicted for the prosecution. Mrs. Wolf was sentenced, and Justices Hindsdale, Holbrook and McKean sentenced her to three months in the penitentiary.

HEARING ON BUTCHERS' BILL.

Albany, April 29.—Governor Odell gave a hearing this afternoon on the bill of Assemblyman Adler, amending the law requiring butcher shops to close on Sunday, by providing that Hebrew butchers, who close their places of business on Saturday, may remain open on Sunday. Among those who appeared in favor of the bill were the Rev. Dr. Bernard Drachman, the Rev. Dr. Philip Klein, former president of the Association of Retail Butchers of Albany, Assemblyman O'Connell, of New-York, and a large delegation of rabbis from Albany and other cities of the State.

Governor Odell at the close of the hearing stated that the original butchers' closing bill had been enacted without any great opposition. The bill under consideration was for the convenience of the part of the population of the State. He was of the opinion that next fall those interested could get together and work out an adequate amendment. However, he had not made up his mind what he would do with the Adler bill, but would act on it in a day or two.

There was a brief struggle between the two for a furlong, and then All Green gradually drew away and won by a length. All Gold was the same distance before Flax Spinner, who finished third.
