ART AT THE PAN-AMERICAN. PAINTERS, SCULPTORS AND OTHERS WHOSE WORKS WILL BE ON VIEW AT THE EXPOSITION.

It is said by William A. Coffin, director of fine arts at the Pan-American Exposition, that the completion of the Art Building at the exposition has been so much delayed from various causes that the work of the installation of the exhibits cannot be begun at once.

The director of fine arts has made a special effort to obtain pictures which have been medalled in various American art exhibitions, such as the Society of American Artists, the National Academy of Design, the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, the Philadelphia Art Club, the Boston Art Club, the Carnegie Institute at Pittsburgh, the Art Institute of Chicago, etc. Nearly one hundred of these works, which are known as "prize pictures," have been obtained for the exhibition. The entire collection of the Shaw Fund prize pictures which have been exhibited at the Society of American

Artists, this city, is lent by the owner, Samuel T. Shaw, Art Institutions, particularly the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts and the Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh, and prominent collectors, such as Charles L. Freer, Howard Mansfield, William T. Evans, Lyman G. Bloomfield, George A. Hearn, James W. Ellsworth, H. Kirke Porter, Colin Armstrong and H.
