THE RACETRACK ONLY A SINGLE FAVORITE WON AT MORRIS PARK—SPECTACULAR FINISH FOR TYRSHENA.

It was a day of troubles yesterday at Morris Park. In the first place, only one favorite won, while several of the first choices that lost went to the post heavily backed, greatly to the profit of the bookmakers.

Most of the trouble happened when a big bunch of two-year-olds—fourteen, to be exact—faced the barrier five furlongs from the finish of the Eclipse Course, in the "Bouquet" selling affair run as the fourth race.

The most surprising upset of the day was the defeat of Semper Ego, a hot favorite in the St. Nicholas hurdle race, at a mile and a half, which was a surprise because he had been so well backed.

But for poor judgment on the part of Shaw, who had a four and a half furlong sprint for two-year-olds, the Getaway could not get through. When in the final scramble for the wire a chink opened up ahead of him and he was able to snatch the place from the very teeth of Red Damsel.

Sweet Lavender was in a beast of a temper when the three-year-olds filled in for the first time. She refused to face the barrier, and it took two bull whips to drive her.

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DAVID GARRICK'S CHESTER CUP.

London, May 8.—At the second day's racing at Chester to-day the Chester Cup, handicap of 2,500 sovereigns, for three-year-olds and upward, distance nearly two miles and a quarter, was won by P. Lorillard's bay colt David Garrick, by Tenny-Quel, ridden by Lester Reiff.

The victory of the American horse upset calculations. Admiral Drake led to the turn, when Stocadon drew to the front, but gave way to David Garrick, who won by two lengths. Three lengths separated second and third horses.

The Badminton Two-year-old Plate, of 200 sovereigns, five furlongs, was won by Captain R. W. Selous's bay colt, the Duke, by Carnegie.


