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JACQUELIN. Who defeated "Major" Taylor in Paris yesterday.

Who defeated "Major" Taylor in Paris yesterday. spectators. It reminded veterans of the enthusiastic receptions given to the other American rider, A. A. Zimmerman, several years ago. In the first race the two men left their marks slowly, and the pace was so slow that at one time both men were leading against the post for a second or two. It looked not unlike the famous match race at Louisville, Ky., several years ago, when the American sprinters, Bald and Cooper. The men continued to crawl around the track until entering the homestretch. Neither wished to set the pace, and each was alert to see that the other did not get the jump first and get too far away at the first sprint. Jacquelin sprinted first, with Taylor close behind. The pace was terrific to the tape, where Jacquelin had a lead of about a wheel's length.

The second race was almost a duplicate of the first. Taylor was the first to sprint this time, but the bulky Frenchman with his higher gear was too much for him, and passing the American in the stretch, won rather easily by nearly ten yards. Jacquelin had a lead of about a wheel's length, but he was himself again. Taylor looked almost a mile behind his rival. Jacquelin rode a wheel longer to 100, which Taylor's gear was about ten yards less. Jacquelin's horse became prominent as a racing man in 1896, when he captured the Ernsdorf, a cycling classic which carries with it a salary so long as the rider has been second or third in the world. Taylor is anxious for another race, but Jacquelin's friends advise him not to take any chances. Jacquelin has been offered a good amount of money to go to America and race during the summer in open competition and match contests, and he may accept.
