

BOOKS AND AUTHORS.

CURRENT TALK OF THINGS PRESENT AND TO COME.

A work on Marie Antoinette in the latter days of the French Monarchy, by Miss Sophia H. MacLehose, will be published soon by the Macmillan Company.

An elaborate book on "The Training of the Body" in relation to participation in sports and good health is announced by E. P. Dutton & Co. by F. A. Schmidt, M. D., and Eustace H. Miles, the latter an historical scholar in Oxford and a noted player of tennis, rackets and squash, who is well known in this country.

Harper & Bros. will begin immediately the publication once a month of what they call the "Portrait Collection" of short stories. The name is derived from the fact that each volume will have on the cover a portrait vignette of the author, and will also contain a colored frontispiece portrait.

The next volume in the Putnam's "Heroes of the Reformation" series will be devoted to Cranmer, and will be written by A. F. Pollard, assistant editor of "The National Dictionary of Biography" and author of "England Under Protector Somerset."

Next week McClure, Phillips & Co. will publish a new book by Josiah Flynt, "The World of Graft," descriptive of the collusion that exists between the police and criminals in large cities.

A book that has attracted considerable attention in England, "The Francis Letters," will be published here soon by E. P. Dutton & Co. They are from the correspondence of Sir Philip Francis, to whom has been attributed the authorship of the Junius letters, and there is an essay on the subject prefixed to the volume by C. F. Keary, to prove the identity of Sir Philip with Junius.

Admiral Evans's book, "A Sailor's Log," seems to have met with an immediate success. It is understood that the publishers had difficulty at first in furnishing a sufficient supply of copies to meet the demand.

"The Backwoodsman," H. A. Stanley's story of frontier life in New-York State, is dedicated by the author to "The student of Revolutionary history, to those who for fifty years have made sport of Cooper's Indians, and to those who have known and met adversity." Mr. Stanley is said to put in an entirely new light the character of Brant, the noted Indian chief, prominent in the early annals of Western New-York.

A new edition of "Three Northern Love Stories," translated from Icelandic by Erik Magnusson and William Morris, is ready for publication by Longmans, Green & Co. The first edition appeared in 1875.

Mr. Van Tassel Sutphen's novel, "The Cardinal's Rose," published here last autumn, has recently been issued in England, and is now to be translated into German, the American publishers, Harper & Bros., report that the book is in its ninth edition.

The Longmans have ready for publication the "Last Essays" of Max Müller, first series. The essays are on "Language, Folklore and Other Subjects," the other subjects including "Kant's Critique of Pure Reason," "Coincidences" (between Christian and Buddhist ceremonials), "How to Work," "Dean Liddell as I Knew Him" and "The Schleswig-Holstein Question in History."

The Macmillan Company announces two new and timely volumes in the Haddon Hall Library of Outdoor Sports, edited by the Marquis of Granby and George A. B. Dewar. These will be on cricket and golf.

Frank M. Chapman's "Bird Life in Colors," published here by the Appletons, has been adapted for publication in Canada by a large Toronto publishing house.

Some recent statements as to the sales of Mr. Kipling's books in England have led to comparisons with the American figures, which are considerably larger. Up to the close of 1900 55,000 copies of "The Jungle Book" had been sold in England and 85,000 in the United States. Of "The Second Jungle Book" the sale there had been 28,000 and here 64,000. A still greater discrepancy is noted in the case of "Captains Courageous," of which the English market had taken 27,000 copies, the American 57,000. Of "The Day's Work" more than one hundred thousand copies have been sold in this country. No fewer than half a million volumes of authorized editions of his works have been disposed of in the United States, and an estimate of the recent sales of the earlier uncopied works leads to the belief that three million copies of his books have been sold here in the last three years.

There have been several translations of Booker T. Washington's autobiography, "Up from Slavery," but now word comes that it is going to appear soon as a book in a native tongue of India. Already several chapters have appeared in the "Kankalei-Hind" ("The Star of India"), a weekly paper widely read by Indian Christians. The translator's name is Lilavati Singli.

The ever increasing demand for books on sports and other out-of-door subjects explains the high degree of specialization that will characterize the new undertaking of this sort that the Macmillans have in preparation. This is "The American Sportsman's Library," edited by Caspar Whitney, in which each branch of shooting, hunting and fishing will be the subject of a separate volume, by a sportsman well known in his own field. Thus there will be volumes on "The Bear Family," "The Deer Family," "The Musk Ox, Sheep and Goat," "The Cougar," "The Wild Cat and Lynx," "Trout and Salmon," other fish, and on various game birds.

A new book by Mr. Ernest Seton-Thompson will be brought out in the fall by the Scribners, which they confidently expect will be even more attractive than "Wild Animals I Have Known," which has now nearly reached its hundredth thousand. The new book will be called "Lives of the Hunted," and, as its title indicates, it will deal with the same friends that Mr. Seton-Thompson has so delightfully exploited in his previous books. Like them, it will be filled with pictures of his own production, marginal, text and full page.

The Putnam has in preparation a volume of short stories and sketches of life in Virginia before the Civil War, by Marion Harland. It will be called "County Sketches."

Almost coincident with the revival in Paris of Sardou's play "Patrie" dedicated to Motley and dealing with the heroic struggles of the Dutch against their Spanish oppressors Longmans, Green & Co. are publishing a novel on the same subject, by H. C. Bailey, entitled "My Lady

of Orange." It is a stirring tale of adventure, in which it is related how the leader of a "free company" takes his men from Alva to the service of the Prince of Orange, and wins a maid of Holland.

Messrs. Houghton, Mifflin & Co. announce a collection of poems by William Vaughan Moody, who has published not a little verse in "The Atlantic Monthly." Mr. Moody is instructor in English in the University of Chicago, and previously occupied a similar position at Harvard. He has published "The Mask of Judgment," a drama in verse, and is editor of the volume devoted to Milton in the Cambridge Poets Series.

George C. Hazelton's "Miss Nell," the dramatic version of which is now playing in this city, will be brought out in London in its form as a novel, as the Scribners have published it here. Mr. John Murray has just bought the English rights, and will issue it in the near future. There is said to be more than a possibility that both play and novel will be translated into French, the play for the use of Sarah Bernhardt, whose manager saw it for her in Boston, and reported favorably upon it.

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A letter bearing testimony to the rational view with which even the most patriotic Filipinos now regard American rule has been received by Mr. Albert Sonnichsen, who wrote "Ten Months a Captive Among Filipinos." It is from Gabino de Castro, to whom that book is dedicated, and who addresses Mr. Sonnichsen as "My dear and highly esteemed friend."

Of a certain regrettable timeliness will be the speedy appearance from the press of McClure, Phillips & Co. of Professor L. O. Howard's book on "Mosquitoes." The author is chief entomologist of the Department of Agriculture, and he will impart the latest knowledge and theory concerning the mosquito, now under the strict scrutiny of the medical profession for its part in conveying the infection of malaria.

The Harpers are publishing a romance of the early eighteenth century, in France and America, called "The House of De Mally." Miss Potter is still under twenty, but this is her third book; she is the daughter of a wealthy Chicago man, and when she was only seventeen published under a pseudonym "A Social Lion," which is said to have caused considerable excitement in Chicago.
