MAN AND BABY DIE AT PLAY.

William Gallagher, twenty-eight years old, and William O'Keefe, an infant, fifteen months old, who was in Gallagher's arms, met with instant death yesterday at their home, No. 236 York-st., Jersey City, by falling down an elevator shaft.

Gallagher, who has only been married six months, lived with his wife on the fourth floor on one side of the hallway, while on the other side O'Keefe's parents have their home.

Policeman William Tooman, who lives in the house, ran to the cellar, where he found Gallagher's body and the child's wedged between the car and the shaft. It was impossible to move the car, and Tooman was obliged to cut the car to pieces with an axe before he could extricate the bodies.
