and the manifold details that go to make up the

life of a progressive government indicates that

going on in the Western Hemisphere—a battle

in which the Pan-American Exposition is de-

signed to teach many valuable lessons.

Chill has been generous in this effort. It con-

siders its venture somewhat in the light of a

speculation, and it intends to stake everything

possible upon it, but, when a government acts

in this way, it is believed the results will warrant

it, and the commissioners themselves believe

the \$500,000 in Chilian money that their govern-
