

PLAN TO OUST DEVERY. BUSINESS MEN GIVE IT THEIR SUPPORT.

MURPHY WILL BE FORCED TO REMOVE THE BULLY OR ASSUME THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR HIS ACTS. Many business men, politicians and members of the Police Department declared yesterday that Deputy Police Commissioner Devery had made himself so offensive as a public official that his removal from office was imperative.

It was learned that a movement to bring charges against Devery is on foot, and has the support of business men of the city. The movement, it is said, had its beginning in the offer of the Merchants' Association of New-York to protect policemen who did their duty, and were ready, like Patrolman O'Neill, to protest against blackmail and corruption in the Police Department.

The plan is said to be to present to Commissioner Murphy such charges against Devery that the Commissioner will not be obliged to remove Devery from office or publicly to acknowledge that he is responsible for Devery's acts.

PANIC OVER DEVERY.

Devery's treatment of Marrinan has aroused a mass of revolutionaries in the department, and that spirit has been increased by Devery's treatment of old Patrolman Monahan. Devery virtually drove the veteran out of the department.

LARGE ELEMENT IN TAMMANY FEARS HE WILL UNDO THE PARTY.

Devery's continuance as Deputy Police Commissioner, with power to suspend police trials and members of the force with the vilify and disgusting language with which he is in the habit of expressing himself, will be a question for Richard Croker to settle soon after he lands. The recent exhibitions Devery has made of himself have aroused a strong feeling against him in the Tammany ranks.

DEVERY'S AUTHORITY TO BE TESTED.

A writ of certiorari has been served on Commissioner Murphy in the case of Policeman Woodley, of Staten Island, who was tried by Devery and dismissed from the force. The writ was procured on the ground that the law does not authorize the Commissioner to delegate to a subordinate the power to try police cases.
