STRIKE LIKELY TO FAIL. SWITCHMEN LACK LABOR SUPPORT AND RAILROADS ARE FIRM IN RESISTING DEMANDS.

Pittsburg, Nov. 26.—Judging from the apparent conditions, the switchmen's strike, which was begun this morning, has proved a flat failure.

A meeting of the union was held this afternoon, and the claim was made that the strike was a success as far as it had gone, and that within forty-eight hours the members of the union, about seven hundred, would be out.

In their demands the switchmen asked for the enforcement of the standard scale of wages. This calls for 2 cents an hour for day foremen and conductors, the night men to receive two cents more an hour, their work being more difficult and dangerous.
