BUFFALO DEFEATS MEADOW BROOK. HANDICAP TOO HEAVY FOR FREEBOOTERS.—STEVENS THROWN, BUT UNHURT.

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SON OF GOLDFINCH AGAIN SHOWS HIS QUALITY—DAY FOR THE MUDLARKS AT GRAVESEND.

Only one happening of importance loomed through the mud and the gloom at Gravesend yesterday afternoon. That was the victory of Green B. Morris's sterling three-year-old colt Old England in the Preakness Stakes. The colt picked up 118 pounds, made most of the running and stood off a determined challenge from Major Daingerfield at the finish, winning in 1:55, nearly two seconds faster than this particular race was ever run before. Old England is the equal, if not the superior, of any three-year-old colt on any track this season. Had he been eligible for the Belmont it is doubtful if Masterman would have won, although Mr. Morris said yesterday that he would not have asked Old England to carry 125 pounds on that cruel run down the long hill. This son of Goldfinch has demonstrated that it is safe to bet on the last race that he can carry weight, that he can go a route and that he can beat him again yesterday, for the colt ran the last eighth of a mile on a dry track. If these things do not constitute a claim to true quality in horses, it is hard to see what does.

Old England would surely have won the Withers from Compuh had he been ridden competently. It was Jackson who beat Old England in that race. It was not Compuh, Jackson all but beat him again yesterday, for the colt ran the last eighth of a mile on his own courage entirely. At the start Namtor went out to run Old England off his feet. He gave it up in half a mile. Then Major Daingerfield, who had been prepared especially for this race, moved up to finish off the killing. He made a determined attempt, aided by Compuh's vigorous ride, but although Old England got no help from his rider, he gallantly withstood the challenge, won by a head and was coming away at the end. He ran the last mile in 1:41.

Newton Bennington seems to have a fair fly in Lady Albacort. At least, she made a show of the field of two-year-old fillies that tried to beat her in the third race yesterday. She was off flying, and raced through the mud so fast that she won by half a city block. The start was bad, and My Queen, who was making her first start and was fancied in the betting, was practically left at the post. Mr. Bennington won heavily on the race, as did the public in general.

It is a pity that the public overlooked in the mile and seventy-yard selling race, after his good performance the last day of the Morris Park meeting at a mile. He made all the pace yesterday, and won by three lengths. H. L. Coleman, the favorite, was third.
