Newport, R. I., July 17.—The race of the 30-footers to-day was sailed in variable weather, first in bright sunshine and then in a drizzling rain, accompanied by vivid lightning and thunder, the wind blowing almost a gale from the southwest, with occasional nasty squalls. It was a sweepstakes race over the Dyer's Island course, in which three women sailed on the boats. They were Mrs. Rutherford, on the Barbara; Miss Wood, on the Asahi, and Miss Gladys Brooks, on the Wawa, which was sailed by E. V. R. Thayer, Jr. The start was made at 3:30 from Brenton's Cove, the breeze and the Carolina having a slight advantage. At the Jamestown mark the Esperanza took the lead, and on the run up the bay outran all the fleet. She rounded the outer mark half a minute to the good.
