AGREEMENT SIGNED AFTER CONFERENCE WITH SKITT

The general strike on all the lines of the Manhattan Railway Company, which was threatened for several days, was averted yesterday afternoon as the result of a final conference between Vice-President Skitt of the company and the representatives of the engineers, motormen and firemen.

When the conference was over the following typewritten statement was handed to the reporters as coming from both sides, with the intimation that neither side would give any details of the settlement:

WIFE FEARS FOUL PLAY.

MYSTERY IN DEATH OF W. B. LEEDS'S YACHT STEWARD.

ONE MESSAGE ASSIGNING HEART FAILURE AS CAUSE AND ANOTHER ALLEGING SUICIDE LEAD HIS WIFE TO APPEAL TO CAPTAIN TITUS.

The body of Gilbert G. Tallandier, thirty-four years old, steward on the yacht Anita, under charter by W. B. Leeds, was brought to this city on Monday from Marblehead, Mass., where he died last Saturday.

Even with this Mrs. Tallandier cannot believe that there was foul play in the death of her husband. She says that her husband, who had been a steward for the last seven years, was engaged to go on the Anita by A. J. McIntosh, a yacht broker, called on her and said that he had heard that the dead man had shot himself in the vessel and that his body was taken ashore.

The next she heard was when a telegram came on Saturday night, signed by Captain Bennett, telling her that her husband had died from heart failure. Then her brother, a coroner, called on her and said that he had heard that the dead man had shot himself in the vessel and that his body was taken ashore.

Mr. McIntosh had not been gone long when a man came who represented himself as Mr. Leeds's secretary. He also assured her that she would never want for money.

PRINCE CHEN DEPARTS.

CHINESE PARTY HAS A DAY FULL OF EXPERIENCES.

As soon as the party had entered the Mayor's office Secretary Reynolds introduced the Chinese Consul, who in turn introduced the prince and his suite.

On behalf of the administration and the citizens of New-York I have the honor to extend to your royal highness Prince Chen and associates at the most cordial welcome.

Nations, as well as individuals, cannot do better than live that rule of Confucius which has been the government of your two years ago.

Immediately after the address of welcome the consul interpreted to his highness what Mr. Fornes had said.

The Acting Mayor, after the reply, shook the prince by the hand, and also grasped the hands of several of his suite.

HE FAVORS THE GOVERNMENT'S INSULAR POLICY—APPOINTMENT DELAYS MASSACHUSETTS.

EXTRA SESSION RUMORS

NO DECISION YET REACHED BY THE PRESIDENT.

THE SENATE MAY BE CALLED TO MEET IN NOVEMBER—CUBAN RECIPROCITY AND LOAN.

Washington, Aug. 12.—Talk of an extra session of Congress to deal with the Cuban situation is entirely too premature to warrant serious consideration.

At any rate, he sees no need even of agitating the question at this time, as mere agitation can do no possible good, either in Cuba or the United States.

AGITATION AT PRESENT DEPRECIATED.

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UNFAVORABLE VIEW OF CUBAN LOAN.

THE PRESIDENT SAYS HE WOULD RISK RENOMINATION TO SECURE RECIPROCITY—THE EXTRA SESSION QUESTION.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Aug. 12.—"I would risk my renomination to give justice to Cuba through reciprocity," said President Roosevelt recently, in conversation with a government official who visited him here.

The President has not authorized any statement that he will call an extraordinary session of the Senate in the fall.

The President's views with respect to an extra session remain exactly what they were when he left Washington.

President Roosevelt has had no conference with Secretary Hay or any other official relative to a reciprocity treaty with Cuba since Congress adjourned.

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
