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COAL FAMINE AT HAND. SMALL SUPPLIES REPORTED FROM MANY CITIES.

NO LARGE CARGOES OF ANTHRACITE HAVE COME TO NEW-YORK IN SEVERAL WEEKS.

Dealers in anthracite coal in this city declared yesterday that the supply of hard coal here had been practically exhausted for weeks. The railroad companies have been able to deliver only a few thousand tons a day recently, and much of it is known as washed coal. Every city within a radius of one hundred miles of New-York has been drained of its supplies of anthracite to supply the demands of consumers who must have hard coal at any price...

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(By Telegraph to the Tribune.) Detroit, Aug. 13.—There are now about 25,000 tons of anthracite in this city, without the slightest prospect, in the opinion of one of the dealers, of getting any more until the miners get back. A famine will come and winter sets in. Coal is now sold at \$7 a ton, a rise of 50 cents over the price that obtained here a year ago...

Philadelphia, Aug. 13.—United States Senator Penrose to-day, in discussing the anthracite coal strike, made the following statement: "Both Senator Quay and myself have always been ready to receive any delegation from the miners and do all in our power to bring an end to the present troubles. For a long time past this question has been receiving our attention, and if there is anything we can do toward settling the difficulty it will be done."

Buffalo, Aug. 13.—The Erie Railroad's Buffalo side coal is the only anthracite that can be bought in Buffalo at present at a price of \$5.65 a ton, and is not the best quality of hard coal. The Philadelphia and Reading, the Delaware and Hudson and the Delaware and Western railroads have all stopped the sale of anthracite at their trestles and have closed their local agencies, thereby putting an absolute stop to their coal business...
