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EXPLOSION STOPS CARS. MEN IN POWER HOUSE BLINDED. LIGHTS ON ALL BRONX ELEVATED CARS GO OUT.

The entire elevated railroad system in The Bronx was at a standstill from a breakdown at 1 o'clock this morning. Enormous feed wires carry the power from the main power house to the power house of the Manhattan Railway at One-hundred-and-sixty-first-st. and Third-ave.

The explosion made a loud report and blinded for some minutes all the men in the power house. It was accompanied by sheets of flames and by play of blue and colored flashes that shot hither and thither through the big building and out of the windows.
