THE RACETRACK. GLENGAR KILLED BY A FALL IN A STEEPLECHASE.

"PITTSBURGH PHIL" SCORES WITH BRUNSWICK—THREE FAVORITES WIN RACES AT GRAVESEND.

The King's Highway Steeplechase Handicap at Gravesend yesterday resulted in the death of one of the horses, and that his rider escaped serious injury.

"Pittsburgh Phil" engineered a successful coup when Brunswick, ridden by McGovern, brother of "Terry" McGovern, romped in an easy winner of the third race.
