

AZTEC AND MAYA CULTURE

BATTRES TELEGRAPHS DETAILS OF DISPUTE AT AMERICANIST CONGRESS TO DIAZ

Some phases of Aztec and Maya culture, the highest civilization reached on this continent north of Panama, were considered by the Society of Americanists yesterday. The whole day was devoted to these topics, yet without a hearing for all the papers which had been offered.

The last of the six vice-presidents, Dr. Hjalmar Stolpe, of Sweden, having served as presiding officer in the morning, the chair was occupied in the afternoon by A. P. Maudslayi, an Englishman, who has spent much time and money in studying Maya ruins in Central America. Photographs of temples, tombs and monuments, covered with grotesque carvings, were suspended on either side of the auditorium.

Several of them have been duplicated at the expense of the Duke of Loubat in order that they should be studied by other experts. Dr. Selier said yesterday that as little could be learned from the pictures of the ancient Mexicans as from the sacred writings of the Egyptians about the common people.

Señor Leopoldo Batres gave an extended account of the work done in excavating the pyramidal platforms of the sacred city of Monte Alcan. The substance of this story has already been published. Peculiar interest was felt in the man, however, on account of his being ignored the other day in a statement made by another Mexican delegate, Señor Chavero.

Señor Francisco Belmar, from the State of Oaxaca, Mexico, discussed the Indian tribes of that region and their language.

At 10 a. m. to-day a meeting will be held to determine the place where the congress will be held. The impression prevails that some German city will be selected. Dr. von den Steinen will probably present a formal invitation to the society.
