Albany, Nov. 18 (Special).—The first session of the third State conference of those interested in the charitable and correctional work of the State was held in the Senate Chamber to-night.

ALLISON HOLDS HIS OFFICE.

COURT OF APPEALS UPHOLDS THE JURY COMMISSIONER LAW.

Albany, Nov. 18.—By a vote of 4 to 3 the Court of Appeals has declared constitutional Chapter 602 of the Laws of 1901, the law under which Thomas Allison was appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department, to the office of Commissioner of Jurors for New-York County.

The act of 1901 was passed after the constitution of 1894, it creates the office of Commissioner of Jurors in every county having the required population, which includes the county of New-York.
