OBITUARY.

COLONEL JOHN B. MEYENBERG.

Colonel John B. Meyenberg died on Friday at his home, No. 408 Eighth-st., Brooklyn, at the age of sixty-two years. He was born in Bremen, and came to this country in 1859. He studied law in the office of Judge Lynch, in Brooklyn, in 1877, and in the same year was elected to the legislature.
