BISHOP BURGESS RAPS EDDYISM.

He Speaks of the "Miserable Travesties of the Old Faith Cures." At St. James's Church, Brooklyn, yesterday morning, Dr. Burgess, Bishop of Long Island, instituted the new rector, the Rev. Thomas J. Crosby, and in the course of his sermon said regarding Christian Science:

Of all the strange perversions of Christianity the most curious is that one of modern times which is known as Christian Science. It is a religion which ignores the physical—and which asks its disciples to believe in Christ for the production of health. It is a religion which ignores the principles of such a religion as that of the Roman Emperor Nero, which turned away and it has been in vogue all down the ages. The tradition that a magician, Jesus, dwelling in Jerusalem, could cure him of his leprosy, is a miracle, but it is a miracle which is not to be taken as a precedent for the kind of thing which is done in the name of the Lord of our day.
