

Visitors Find in Valley of the Nile.

When the children who have seen pictures of the pyramids and the Sphinx in their school books grow up and make a visit to Egypt they will find what the pictures gave them cause to expect. A burning, sandy waste under a hot, cloudless sky; dust, heat and parching blasts from the desert are, according to the oldtime books, the things which must be faced by the visitor to the pyramid of Cheops. But the real picture is different. One goes from Cairo to the pyramids by a good road. The distance is seven miles, and along the whole way there are green fields of acacia trees. To the people who have seen the stock pictures of the pyramid of Cheops, this fine row of trees is a revelation, and as the cooling breeze which makes the drive a real pleasure. There are fine gardens on both sides of the road, and beyond these are the verdant plains of the Nile Valley. To the west and the south there is the desert, but as one comes from Cairo this is not seen, and when the carriage venders who run beside the carriage offer delicious strawberries in green leaves it is hard to believe that one is in Egypt, driving from Cairo to the pyramids.

A trolley line is now being built on Cheops, and in a few months one will be able to make the trip by that means. Some people say that it was wrong to allow the line to be built. But others contend that the grandeur of the monuments to which the road leads will not be lessened by the modern means of conveyance, and that the picture will not suffer any more than Niagara does from similar causes. The trolley line is not nearly so objectionable to some tourists as the sign bearing the words "American Bar," which is so conspicuous that every one must see it at the place where horses and camels usually rest on the way to and from Cheops. To go to the top of the Arab guides pull and push the visitors, and when one reaches the highest point he wonders how he got there, because from these pyramids looks more like a precipice than a pyramid. It is five hundred feet high, and has to be climbed and to be descended. But the guides are so accustomed to making the trip that they race up and down the rugged wall to win small coins offered by visitors to the feetest. A man who was there recently said that descent was not nearly so difficult as it appeared to be. "All one has to do," he said, "is to take two hundred and fifty two-foot jumps, with guides in front and behind to keep you from falling. It would be no fun to do that without the guides, for on one would be liable to slip, fall and roll down the steps, and might be killed."
