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G. B. MAGOUN DIES SUDDENLY.

Business Worry Said To Have Brought on Apoplexy.

Bayonet, Long Island, Dec. 16.—Coroner Moore was informed to-day of the sudden death last night of George B. Magoun, a Stock Exchange broker and a member of the firm of Magoun Brothers.

According to the investigation made by Coroner Moore, Mr. Magoun was found last night unconscious in his room by his wife, who quickly telephoned for Dr. Hewlett.

George Butler Magoun was the youngest son of the late George B. Magoun. He was born in this city thirty-three years ago, was graduated from Harvard University in 1883, and studied medicine for two years.

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COURT ORDERS VERDICT FOR BISHOP. Deposed Pennsylvania Episcopal Rector Loses Damage Suit.

Huntingdon, Penn., Dec. 16.—The case of Dr. L. N. W. Irvine, the deposed rector of St. John's Episcopal Church here, against Bishop Talbot and Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Elliott, of Huntingdon, for \$25,000 damages, ended to-day, when, on motion of the attorneys for the defence, the court instructed the jury to render a verdict for the defendants.

ROBBERS GOT CATTLEMEN'S MONEY. Rode from Bank with \$20,000 Without a Battle.

El Paso, Tex., Dec. 16.—It is estimated that the Hillboro (N. M.) bank lost \$20,000 in the robbery there, details of which have just reached El Paso. Cattlemen had just made big deposits which the robbers had got and rode for the Black Range, in Sierra County. The identity of the robbers is unknown.
