BANK OFFICERS' TRIAL. Former President and Paying Teller of Seventh National in Court.

William H. Kimball, formerly president of the Seventh National Bank, and Gamaliel W. Rose, paying teller of the bank, were placed on trial yesterday in the Criminal Branch of the United States Court...

In his opening address Mr. Baldwin explained to the jury that since 1882, under the National Banking law, any officer of a bank who certified checks when there was not enough in the bank...

Through the deposits of these checks, it was alleged, the bank was unable to keep a correct balance of the account with Marquand & Co. Mr. Baldwin stated that these checks deposited in the afternoon were practically worthless, and on June 25 the clearing house became cognizant of the transactions...

Mr. Baldwin then handed to the jury the checks of Marquand & Co. for the purpose of identifying them. These checks were the ones referred to by Mr. Baldwin in his opening address, and the certification of which was responsible for the indictment of Mr. Kimball and Mr. Rose. Mr. Adams swore to the certification of the checks had been executed, with but one exception, by Mr. Rose.

When Mr. Adams had finished his identification of the checks one of the books of the bank was handed him by Mr. Baldwin. Mr. Adams went through page after page of the book and picked out the entries in it relating to the checks in question. He declared that most of the entries had been made in the book by Mr. Rose. Mr. Baldwin asked a number of questions for the purpose of getting Mr. Adams to testify from the records of the book and establish the approximate time on each day when the Marquand & Co. checks were certified...

Q—Who had charge of the Marquand accounts in the bank? A—I don't really know. Q—Did Rose ever ask you about the certification of any of the Marquand checks? A—Some of them, I think. Q—What did you do about them? A—I referred them to Mr. Kimball.

The meeting that was called by the Citizens Union to protest against the repeal of the Ford Franchise act, was held at the headquarters of the Union, No. 34 Union Square, last evening.

Resolved, That the chairman appoint a committee of ten to confer with all organizations opposed to a repeal of the Special Franchise Tax act, with power to arrange for mass meetings, to circulate petitions and to take such other measures as may seem to them proper to secure the present law, and with power to add others to the committee.
