

POWELL ON THE STAND.

"MONEY NOT FOR HIM."

Says at Inquiry He Simply Wanted to Do a Good Act.

The legislative committee appointed to investigate the charges made against George F. Powell, sergeant at arms of the House of Assembly, met in Chancery Chambers at Newark yesterday.

The committee, composed of Assemblymen Avis, of Cumberland County (chairman); Elvins, of Atlantic; Hillery, of Morris; Colby, of Essex, and Schumann, of Hudson, met at 10:45 a. m.

One of the earliest arrivals was Mr. Edmunds. He was soon followed by William Gaines, the colored man who was closely connected with the case.

The committee began the proceedings by the chairman requesting the clerk to read a newspaper article in relation to the case.

COSGROVE TESTIFIES.

The first witness called was John Cosgrove, captain of detectives of the Newark police force. After saying that he had detailed Detectives Tuite and Wiggins on the case, his testimony got into the marrow of the matter.

The next witness was Frank Tuite, a detective sergeant, who said that from a clue they had received they suspected that Percy Wagner, the assistant janitor of Grace Church, was the thief.

GLORI'S LONG STORY.

Detective Glori was the next witness, who replied to a question by the chairman, that he was "going to tell the true facts," and "must have his own way about it."
