

LITERARY NOTES.

An uncut copy of the first edition of Smollett's "Humphrey Clinker" 1771 (the first volume being dated 1671), brought \$205 at a London auction sale the other day. The last copy sold (in 1855) fetched much less—\$100 to wit.

An English reprint of the new edition—just brought out in this country by the Scribners—of that always delightful book by the late Clarence King, "Mountaineering in the Sierra Nevada," is to be issued almost immediately in London. It is a book, let us add, which every cultivated American should own and read with pride in his countryman.

Vienna has a library for the blind containing a thousand volumes, and including a good deal of music. The indigent blind, we are glad to note, have free use of this library.

Mr. W. Jacobs has a long novel in mind, and is clearing the decks by finishing a number of short stories. This author, who lives near Epping Forest, has no particular method in his work, and has never kept a sturdy resolution to work regularly five hours a day. We are told that "Mr. Jacobs once went so far as to nail up a card in his study, 'Office Hours 10-4.' This picture, however, was torn down by his justly indignant daughter, eighteen months old, and has never been replaced."

Miss Alice Duer Miller wrote her clever novelle, "A Man of His Word," in Costa Rica, where her husband is interested in rubber planting. She has declared that "nothing more conducive to the pleasure afforded by life in a Spanish-American country. On the upper slopes of the volcanoes, four thousand feet above the sea, a perfect climate beautiful surroundings and absolute leisure are combined."

Canon Ainger, Master of the Temple, and biographer and editor of Lamb, once uttered this witty saying: "You may preach like an angel, but if you can whistle on a stick people ignore your preaching and speak of you as 'the man who can whistle on a stick.'"

Mr. William Le Queux has been writing a novel with the queer title of "The Three Glass Eyes." His other novel, "The Seven Secrets," has just appeared.

What was the origin of the dance known as the "Highland Fling"? Mrs. Lindsay, in her just published "Recollections of a Royal Parish," quotes a neat description of that origin—a kilt and mizick!

Mr. George Meredith is mentioned as perennially youthful. "I suppose I should regard myself as growing old," he says, "I am seventy-four. But I do not feel to be growing old either in heart or mind. I still look on life with a young man's eye. I have always hoped I should not grow old as some do—with a palsied intellect, living backward, regarding other people as anachronisms because they themselves have lived on into other times and left their sympathies behind them with their years."

Of the late Thomas B. Reed it is said that he was a lover of good books. A contributor to "The Atlantic" notes that when at his home, in Portland, "he was certain to be seen almost at any hour in hand—the same book, nor books of the same kind. He read and delighted in poetry—had the sensibilities it moved and gratified."

At the sale of the library of the late Lionel Johnson a copy of Walter Pater's "Essays" from the "Guardian" (only one hundred copies printed, 1890), brought \$43. A large paper copy of Symonds's "Life of Cellini" brought \$37, and one of the twenty-five copies of Lionel Johnson's poems, printed in 1885, brought \$17.50. A presentation copy to Mr. Johnson of Oscar Wilde's book, "The Picture of Dorian Grey," has just been sold for \$10.

The bust of Carlyle made by the late J. E. Boehm was sold in London the other day. In connection with the sittings for this bust the sculptor used to tell this characteristic story: "A day or two before one of the sittings Boehm met Gladstone at a country house, and was immensely impressed by the extent and diversity of his conversation. Boehm was still full of the subject when the morning arrived for Carlyle's sitting, and to the philosopher the sculptor poured forth his admiration for Gladstone's intimate acquaintance with subjects so far apart as gardening and Greek. Carlyle listened for a time in scornful silence. Then he said: 'Oh, nothing like that, nothing like your work.' 'Oh, nothing like that, nothing like your work,' said Boehm, 'of course,' growled Carlyle, 'of course, and he showed his knowledge about things that you didn't understand. No doubt if you asked Blackie he'd say that Gladstone knew nothing about Greek and the gardener would tell you that he knew nothing whatever of gardening.'"

Let it be remembered of the late Augustus Here that he was one of the most generous of men. He was one of the few authors, it may be added, who could afford to be lavish in munificence. It is stated that in the grounds at Holmhurst, his residence near Hastings, there is a large cottage which for thirty years had been set aside as a summer residence for parties of people who were unable to afford themselves the change and rest which they needed.

The author of "Supernatural Religion," a book which has had thousands of thinking readers, has lately been discovered in the person of Mr. Cassell, a Scotch gentleman. Even his publisher did not know the author's name, the title of paper on which it was written having been lost untraced. It is told of Mr. Cassell that his sensitiveness to animal pain led him some time ago to discontinue shooting on his estate.

Those who have cared most for Mr. Kipling's work will re-echo Mr. Newbold's appeal to him to return to the vein in which he achieved things worth remembering: In that Day's Work be sure you gained, my friend, If not the critic's name, at least his end; Your song and story might have roused a slave To see life better and see it brave. With voice so genial and so long of reach To your own people you the Law could preach, And even now and then without offence To Lessor Breeds expose their lack of sense. Return, return! and let us hear again The ringing chantry of the shore-wind's verse. To laugh to licker and too strong to curse, Let us again with hearts serene behold The coastwise beacons that we knew of old; So shall you guide us when the stars are veiled, And stand among the Lights that never fail.
