DR. VAN DYKE'S SON DEAD. (BY TELEGRAPH TO THE TRIBUNE.) Princeton, N. J., March 20.—The youngest son of the Rev. Dr. Henry van Dyke, moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly, died to-day from whooping cough. On Monday night, Dr. van Dyke was called home from Chicago on account of the child's serious illness. On Tuesday artificial respiration became necessary, and the continued and repeated at frequent intervals until the child died this morning. Two specialists in children's diseases from New York were in consultation since Tuesday. The funeral will be held at the convenience of the family.

EX-SENATOR FEETER DEAD. Albany, March 20.—The Senate, after being in session five minutes this morning, adjourned until Monday evening, out of respect to the memory of ex-senator James D. Feeter, of Little Falls, whose death was announced by Senator E. R. Brown. Mr. Feeter, who represented the XXXIII Senate District in the legislature in 1892-1893, died suddenly at his home from heart disease to-day. He leaves a widow. He was born in Little Falls in 1846. He was a delegate to the Cincinnati National Convention in 1876 and voted for Grover Cleveland as long as he was a candidate. He was one of the eleven delegates from New York who voted for Blaine, instead of Hayes, when Conkling's name was withdrawn.

CYCLIST KILLED BY ELECTRIC WIRE.

Caretaker of H. M. Darlington Found Dead by the Roadside.

Domnick Guglielm, a caretaker for Henry M. Darlington, the wealthy Pittsburg steel man, and hostler at his home at Orietta Point, Mamaroneck-on-the-Sound, was killed by an electric light wire in a peculiar manner yesterday.

Domnick Guglielm, who was about thirty-five years old, was on a bicycle riding to the Darlington estate when he was killed. No one saw the accident, but from what Coroner Wiesendanger could learn the man must have encountered the wire hanging down among the trees at the roadside, and seized it with his hands, probably for the purpose of pushing it away. A current of 2,000 volts passed through his body and killed him instantly. The body and bicycle were found by a gardener lying in the middle of the road.
