ASKS VETO OF CONSUMPTION BILL

Committee of Charity Organization Society Sends Appeals to Governor.

The committee on the prevention of tuberculosis of the Charity Organization Society has sent a letter to Governor Odell, requesting him to veto the Goodell-Bodell bill, which is designed to prevent the establishment of any sanatorium for consumptives which, under authority of Chapter 27 of the Laws of 1900, might be erected by a city of the first class outside the city limits.

FOR BRAZILIAN POWDER FACTORY.

Major Ferreira Netto, military engineer of the Brazilian Army, has just arrived here from Rio Janeiro to study for his government the process of manufacture of ordnance and other war material in this country.

N. Y. C. MAKES APPOINTMENT.

Warren H. Knowlton has been appointed principal assistant engineer of the Western District of the New-York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company in charge of the location and construction work. His headquarters will be at Syracuse.

ACTIVITY IN MACHINERY.

New-York, April 29.—A director in authority for the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Co. and its American subsidiary companies has announced that the aggregate \$2,000,000, and that the British Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Co. has received orders for the manufacture of 250,000 horsepower of machinery for the year, for nearly \$5,000,000, and has now employed in the production of the apparatus for the execution of these contracts in excess of 100,000 men.
