

RELIANCE AGAIN LEADS.

YACHT'S FIFTH TRIUMPH.

Wonderful Work to Windward—A Narrowly Averted Collision.

When the 90-foot cup yacht Reliance—again a winner—crossed the finish line off Matinecock Point yesterday afternoon she had won every race in which she had started of the Glen Cove series, inaugurated by the New-York Yacht Club.

The Atlantic Yacht Club opened the racing season on Gravesend Bay yesterday with a contest for Class J and those below, over the shorter courses. Seventeen boats entered the contest and all except two finished.

Both the Reliance and the Constitution have double wheels. At the former were Captain Barr and his chief mate, at the Constitution's Captain Rhodes and R. G. Doremus.

Both Reliance and Constitution came for the line on the starboard tack, the Reliance leading, but the Constitution having the best heading gained an overlap on the other before reaching the stern of the committee boat.

Both arrived too soon at the line. Captain Barr being to leeward, was able to keep his boat off and run parallel to the line to use up a few seconds until gun fire.
