BROWN SHUTS OUT HARVARD.

She Plays Errorless Ball and Wins Game by Score of 6-0.

Providence, R. I., June 3.—Brown defeated Harvard this afternoon by errorless ball playing. In the four games against Harvard, Yale Princeton and Pennsylvania, all of which Brown won, Lynch has been in the box and pitched splendid ball. Today he struck out twelve men against Colburn's eleven, and allowed three hits, while Colburn gave four. Colburn pitched a great game, and had not been for repeated errors in fielding Harvard would have made a net showing. The scoring began in the second inning. Abbott took first on a single and was advanced to second on a hit by Gray. Welch then made a fine bunt. This Colburn, in his anxiety to catch Welch on first, threw wild, letting in Abbott, Gray and Welch. In the next inning Pattee led off with a three-base hit. Lynch went to first on an error by Randall, and then hit home on Abbott's three-run bagger had not the umpire called him out for not touching third base. Abbott then came in on Gray's foul fly. Welch made first on an error by Coolidge and stole second. Clarke then struck out. In the ninth Harvard had two men on bases and none out, but this was as far as she got. Stephenson fled out, Matthews struck out and Clark was put out on first.

LAWN TENNIS.

Miss E. H. Moore Wins from Miss A. M. Risch at N. Y. Lawn Tennis Club.

Play was continued yesterday in the championship lawn tennis tournament on the courts of the New-York Lawn Tennis Club. One-hundred-and-twenty-third and St. Nicholas-ave. Considerable impetus was given to the various contests by the return from Washington of several of the foremost players of the club who have been competing in the Southern States championship. Miss Elizabeth H. Moore, the woman national champion in the singles, won her place in the final round of the women's handicap singles. In accomplishing this she had a narrow escape from defeat at the hands of Miss Anna M. Risch. They met in the semi-final round, and it was a speedy contest for three exciting sets. Wylie C. Grant was beaten in the second round of the singles by Robert Twombly Bryan. The result was something of an upset, as Grant outranks and outclasses his opponent. He was able easily to win the first set by a love score, and then made the mistake of trying to take the match by playing from his back hand, and did not carry the ball half way through Bryan's court. The latter relied upon his place shots and got the ball back over the net, allowing Grant to work his own downfall by his errors. In the last set Grant endeavored to make a stand, but he appeared to lack his usual force, and Bryan won after the games had gone to deuce. The summaries:

GOLF.

Mrs. Manice Still Unbeaten in Women's Championship.

Almost perfect golfing weather favored the continuation of the Women's Metropolitan Golf Association championship at the Richmond County links yesterday. It was a "weeding out" day, with no upsets, and aside from one or two close matches the favorites were able to hold their own nicely. The gallery, mostly women, was divided in following the different matches, and the usual spectacular feature of a crowded field of onlookers was wanting. In spite of the picket line of photographers, always disconcerting to women, the opening drives were capital, and the players got away without a single fizzle. The contestants showed a reluctance to give out detailed cards, and as the match play rules do not compel them few were posted.

CORNELL VARSITY IN NEW SHELL.

Ithaca, N. Y., June 3.—The Cornell varsity crew rowed in the new varsity shell, built for the Poughkeepsie regatta to-day, the boat being launched for the first time. In general the boat follows the 1901 model. John Hoyle, the university's boat builder, constructed it at Ithaca under Court-
