Efforts To Be Made to Deepen Channel of the Delaware River. Trenton, N. J., July 24 (Special).—United States Senator Dryden and Congressman Wiley have promised to help Trenton in its efforts to retrieve its prestige as a river port.

There has been a remarkable change in the character of the Delaware River at this point. Then it was full of strong, sturdy currents. It was deep and capable of floating large vessels laden with valuable cargoes.

The traffic through the canal is large and constantly increasing. It comes mainly from New York and Philadelphia.
