

PURROY IS FIRE CHIEF.

Long Service and Faultless Record of Croker's Successor.

Fire Commissioner Sturgis yesterday announced that he had promoted Deputy Chief Charles D. Purroy to the rank of Chief of the Fire Department.

Chief Purroy was appointed a fireman on January 22, 1880. He was promoted to be an assistant fireman on April 5, 1881, and was made a fireman on December 31, 1881.

During the ten years he was deputy chief Purroy frequently was in command of the Fire Department as acting chief for short periods, and since December 1 he had been the acting chief.

John J. Delany, counsel for Croker, when asked yesterday if he had anything to say about the appointment of Purroy as Chief of the Fire Department, said: "Not at present."

ACCUSED IMPORTER ARRESTED.

Custom House Official Charges Him with Defrauding by False Entries.

Rudolph A. Whiteman, of the firm of Whiteman Brothers, importers of and dealers in bottles' supplies, at No. 185 William-st., was arrested at his place of business yesterday by Deputy United States Marshal Mackenzie and Kennedy, and arrested before Commissioner Shields on a charge of making fraudulent entries at the Custom House.

The complaint, sworn to by A. Aubrey Byrne, a special agent, charges the prisoner and his brother with entering on June 11, 1903, at the Custom House, thirty-seven cases of metal capsules, containing their value in duty, and the value of the same in the United States of America, and in so doing, according to the complaint, they "wrongfully deprived the United States of a portion of the duty thereon, by means of false and fraudulent invoices."

Whiteman declined to make any statement, and his counsel, Abram E. Rose, characterized the arrest as "a little difference between the Custom House officials and Whiteman Brothers as to the relative value of some metal capsules imported by them and that, as a matter of fact, it was of little or no importance."

Whiteman, one of the brothers, is now in Europe, and it is understood, is to be surrendered by his counsel on his return to this country. Commissioner Shields held the prisoner in \$5,000 bail for examination on October 15. Surety was furnished.

CANCELS BERGEN'S BAIL FORFEITURE.

Devery's Brother-in-Law Says He Hadn't Been Told When Case Was to Be Called.

Michael J. Bergen, Devery's brother-in-law, who was recently indicted with Adolph Jantzen, who on Thursday was sentenced to four months in the penitentiary on Blackwell's Island upon his plea of guilty to the charge of having had policy slips in his possession, appeared in Part II of the Court of General Sessions before Judge Newburger yesterday.

GOOD REPORT FROM PATERSON.

Tenement House Commissioners Find Conditions Good in Comparison.

Paterson, July 31.—The State Tenement Commissioners came here yesterday, and spent the day visiting tenement houses throughout the city. The commission expected that, on account of the large foreign population, whose earnings are compared unfavorably with Newark, Jersey City, Hoboken and Trenton, there were, of course, plenty of tenements in which unsanitary conditions prevailed, but these were chiefly on account of the lack of sanitary plumbing, etc. There were few cases found in which there was a lack of sufficient light and air. The worst place was in East Railroad-ave. This is practically a barrack, and was in a filthy condition.

CAN'T SHUT OFF LONG BRANCH WATER

Vice-Chancellor Emery Signs Order Against Tintner Manor Company.

Long Branch, July 30.—Vice-Chancellor Emery at Newark to-day signed an order requiring the Tintner Manor Water Company to show cause why it should not be restrained from cutting off Long Branch's supply of water, as it has been ordered to do on September 1, 1901, a ten years' contract to which the company had with Long Branch lauded. After much argument the city served notice on the company that it would continue to use the water, but would not pay the old rates. A ten years' contract was passed by the Council in December last. The agreement did not specify when the company should pay and the present Council had the courts set it aside. Since September, 1901, the city has paid the company nothing for the water.

The company served notice on the city that unless the back water rent was paid by to-morrow it would cut off the water. This is now blocked by the court order. There is now pending in the courts a suit to determine how much the city owes the company, and as soon as that amount has been judicially fixed the city will pay.

WOMAN SAYS SHE WAS TORTURED.

Men Used Knives to Force Her to Sign Away Property, She Alleges.

Hackensack, July 31 (Special).—Michael Carluca, of Lodi, is a prisoner in the Hackensack jail, together with his son, charged with atrocious assault upon Anna Valentini. The woman told Justice Heath, who issued the warrants for the arrest of the defendants, that the men endeavored to have her sign over to them her \$500 interest in the house in which they lived. She refused to do this, and the men, on several occasions, tortured her by stabbing her in the fleshy parts of her body with knives, always careful not to inflict fatal injuries. The wounds were painful, and when about to undergo another ordeal the woman escaped and came to Hackensack.

THE PASSAIC SEWER TEST CASE.

Paterson, July 31.—City Counsel Michael Dunn to-day obtained a writ of certiorari from Chief Justice Gummere at Point Pleasant, to test the legality of the issue of bonds to the extent of \$1,000,000 for the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission for the construction of trunk sewers. The writ was granted with the consent of counsel for the commission. Mr. Dunn applied for a writ two weeks ago, but the Chief Justice declined to grant it without the consent of the commission.

"TONNEAU."

From Leslie's Weekly. The word "tonneau," often used in describing the body of an automobile, is French, of course, and means a cask. It is applied to those round carriage bodies seating two, four or six passengers. While those of foreign make, particularly those of foreign make, while most American makers have followed the foreign style to the extent of manufacturing bodies of this shape, usually removable, some of them decline to do so on the ground that the tonneau is dusty and uncomfortable, and because its position over the front axle subjects the passengers to an uncomfortable jarring and vibration. On behalf of the tonneau it may be said that it gives a larger seating capacity than is possible in any other form of construction.
