Paris, Aug. 10.—The trial of the Humbert family on the charges of forgery and swindling in connection with the fictitious Crawford millions was resumed this morning, and drew another large crowd to the Palais de Justice.

MAYOR WEAVER PLACES BLAME. The Responsibility for the Fatal Accident at the Philadelphia Ball Park.

Philadelphia, Aug. 10.—Mayor Weaver personally interested himself today in the investigation into the cause of the collapse of the promenade at the Philadelphia National League Baseball Park Saturday, which resulted in the death of nine spectators and serious injury to nearly two hundred others.

TWO TROLLEY FRANCHISES GRANTED. Lines from Mineola to Port Washington and from Glen Cove to Sea Cliff.

Mineola, Long Island, Aug. 10.—The Board of Supervisors of Nassau County today granted two franchises for the construction of trolley roads. One of these was to the Mineola and Port Washington Traction Company.

DIVORCE DECREE SET ASIDE. Woman Says She Never Knew Case Had Been Tried Till Neighbor Told Her.

J. P. Kohler moved before Justice Cochrane, in the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, yesterday, to set aside an interlocutory judgment of divorce obtained against Mrs. Mary E. Harvey by her husband, Edward J. Harvey, by default, on June 18. It is declared by Mrs. Harvey, as already told in The Tribune, that she had no knowledge of the granting of the divorce, and did not know that the case had been tried and a decree granted until a neighbor informed her.

ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP TRAINS. Infernal Machine, Delayed in Transmission, Wrecks a Station.

Constantinople, Aug. 10.—An infernal machine, in the form of a box filled with dynamite, was sent from Philippopolis to Uskub, timed to explode at the latter place at the moment when two passenger trains coming from and going to Salonica were due to pass there.

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
