

14 STEEL SYNDICATE'S LOSS. MAY BE TEN MILLIONS.

Call Made on Members for \$5,000,000 Cash. It was learned in Wall Street yesterday that a call for \$5,000,000 cash had been made on the members by the managers of the United States Steel bond conversion syndicate.

Considerable mystery has surrounded the operations of the syndicate, and it has been impossible to get any of the managers to tell anything about its affairs; but it has been no secret that the syndicate has been greatly disappointed at the failure of the stockholders generally to convert their holdings into bonds.

Steel common made another low record yesterday, selling down to 19 1/2, the previous low figure being 19 1/4. The weakness of the market is attributed generally to reports that the next dividend will be reduced, if not passed.
