



BRITAIN'S PARTY CRISIS. FORECASTS OF CABINET.

Lord Lansdowne to Remain—New Ministry to Meet Soon.

London, Sept. 18.—Lord Lansdowne will remain Secretary for Foreign Affairs, and there is good reason to believe that the report that the War Secretary, Mr. Brodrick, will be transferred to the India Office is correct.

The Westminster Gazette and other papers forecast that Lord Milner, the High Commissioner in South Africa, will succeed to the Colonial Office, and it is definitely announced that Lord Stanley, Financial Secretary to the War Office, and probably James Lowther, Deputy Speaker, will be among those promoted to the Cabinet.

NOT A TARIFF DEFEAT.

Issue of Next Elections More Marked by Resignations.

London, Sept. 18.—Consternation and excitement, caused by the dramatic announcement of Joseph Chamberlain's resignation of the Secretaryship for the Colonies, prevails among all classes in the United Kingdom, to the exclusion of every other topic.

Mr. Balfour has reiterated to friends that his letter to Mr. Chamberlain, accepting his resignation and saying he shared the latter's idea of a closer fiscal union with the colonies, was not a formal expression regarding Mr. Chamberlain's policy, but that he meant what he said.

The persistence with which it is rumored that Austen Chamberlain, the Postmaster General, will succeed Mr. Ritchie as Chancellor of the Exchequer, emphasizes the extraordinary nature of the relations which Mr. Balfour still maintains toward his colleagues.

From all parts of the United Kingdom and the empire editorial expressions of opinion on the crisis are pouring in. The government organs frankly admit that Mr. Chamberlain's withdrawal came as a bombshell.

SCARED TO DEATH.

READY FOR CAMPAIGN.

London, Sept. 18.—Writing to-day from his home at Highbury, Birmingham, Mr. Chamberlain made his first public statement since his resignation. His letter is in reply to C. A. Pearson, chairman of the executive council of the Tariff Reform League, who asked if Mr. Chamberlain coincided with his view that the examination of the tariff may be considered as sufficiently advanced.
