TO COMPARE LOW WITH VAN WYCK.

Brooklyn Fusionists to Contrast Departments Now and Then.

Comparisons of the way the municipal departments were conducted in Brooklyn during the Van Wyck Democratic administration and in the last year under the fusion administration will play an important part in the Low campaign in that borough. The ill health of Borough President Swanstrom will prevent his being as active on the stump as two years ago, but Commissioner William C. Redfield of the Department of Public Works will bring the contrast to the attention of the voters before the public with the aid of stereopticon views.

The visible benefits to the taxpayer, such as improved paving, clean streets, new street signs, public baths and comfort stations, are known to all citizens, but they will now be told about the padded payrolls, the neglected public improvements, the waste of funds to carry on the campaign, the photographs will show the payrolls of the Twenty-sixth Ward sewage disposal works, erected at a cost of \$200,000, to prevent the emptying of unpurified sewage into Jamaica Bay. The photographs will show that the week before election in 1901, the payroll was \$477,700. For five weeks after election the payroll was nothing, showing that prior to election a big force of men was kept on to influence the result, and that after election the sewage was allowed to flow into Jamaica Bay and pollute it. There are other payrolls showing similar misuse of public moneys.

Ex-Controller Theodore W. DON'T FEAR INVASION.

Willoughby Street Deserters Report at McClellan's New Office.

When the Willoughby Street leaders heard yesterday that Tammany Hall was negotiating for rooms in the Temple Bar Building to open a Brooklyn headquarters and conduct its own fight in that borough for the Murphy ticket it did not seem to cause any great commotion in the auction rooms. James Shevlin said he would not be surprised if Tammany would take such a course, and remarked: "They will find before they get through with it that there is a better chance for a political kindergarten on the other side of the river than here. We may open one there when we get around to it." This last was taken to be more jocular than serious.

It is also rumored that Gottfried Westermacher, who on Friday night came out for Tammany, would open headquarters for it at No. 511 Broadway, in the Eastern District. A McLaughlin leader said: "An assessment has already been levied by Murphy on every gambler and poolroom keeper and beneficiary of vice that was protected in Manhattan to pay the expenses of the Tammany campaign in Brooklyn. This sum will be used to corrupt leaders, and then to corrupt voters, to the end that a branch of the red light districts may be established among the churches and homes in Brooklyn."

The office of Senator McClellan, in the Phoenix Building, in Court-st., already has taken on the appearance of an anti-McLaughlin headquarters. He has caused it to be announced that he will be there for several hours about noon every day, and the leaders who have deserted the organization go there instead of to the auction rooms. John Hennessy, the present leader of the 13th District, has announced that to-morrow night he will hold a meeting for the purpose of endorsing Groat and Fomes, as he has defeated for return to the executive committee by Assemblyman Keogh at the last primaries, Hennessy's defection is not troubling McLaughlin.

It was supposed that James Kane would try to swing the 11th District, of which he is leader, for Groat and Fomes, but he has not done so. This is now said to be because he fears he would not be able to do it, as James Dunne, who is more powerful in that district, is standing fast by McLaughlin.

Another on Election Day for Murphy, He Says.

"This is a good hard sozzle of wet that the Almighty has handed down to us," resumed "Bill," "and it has washed the whitewash off of things. That's what's goin' to happen on the 2d of November. Mr. Devery's microbes will be takin' the elevators to the top of the Flatiron Building before the deluge stops. I'm tellin' my peep to strip for the fray, take the bit in their teeth an' put their shoulder to the wheel. They're goin' it, and if the deluge comes down on their heads, it's the occasion when the downward will rise in their might. Charlie Murphy and the Big and Little Sullivans look like calico dogs stuffed with saloon sweeps."

"Things is so strenuous that you can't tell what'll break loose next. Who'd 'a' thought that old Boss Hugh O'Connell would be in Brooklyn now? He used to play marbles with Cleopatra. That shows that one thing leads to another in politics. It's 'hands across the Bay' for me an' Hugh for his trip, sure. He's seem' the light gradually."

"If there was any way of gettin' through the party walls it would be worth the price of your mind when he thinks of how he's spoiled a cinch. He's like a kid that pulls a loaded wheelbarrow over himself on the down grade. In the political graveyard there isn't anything more interestin' than Murphy's sarcophagus. I'll tell the story of a switchman that tried to sidetrack the Peep's Consolidated Express. One of the lines on the stone will be 'Devery done it.'"

LOCAL OPTION BALLOTS.

The Attorney General Holds the Printing Should Be Done by the Town Clerk.

Albany, Oct. 10.—Attorney General Cunniff forwarded to-day to County Clerk E. A. Chapman, of Jefferson County, at Watertown, an opinion in response to Mr. Chapman's inquiry as to who should provide the ballots for the submission of the local option questions under the liquor tax law.

The Attorney General holds that "Where the liquor tax law provides that the duty of printing the ballot for the local option proposition shall devolve upon the officer upon whom the printing of the official ballot devolves, such officer should be construed to mean the officer upon whom the printing of the official ballot for town propositions devolves. I am therefore of the opinion that the town clerk in each town where the local meeting is held at the same time as the general election would be the proper officer to print the ballots under the local option provision of the liquor tax law, unless there is some special or local statute to the contrary."

THE HOME MARKET'S VALUE.

Secretary Shaw on the Evils That Would Result from Free Trade.

Akron, Ohio, Oct. 10.—Large crowds gathered in this city to-day to listen to the addresses of Leslie M. Shaw, Secretary of the Treasury, and Warren G. Harding, candidate for Lieutenant Governor, at the opening of the Republican campaign in this county. The meeting was held at the Colonial Theatre. Mr. Shaw was in good voice. This was the first meeting in the tour which he will make through the State. He spoke in part as follows:

One of the most important problems before the American people is that of markets. In this respect the importance of the ultimate fact, they do not agree upon the methods to be pursued in the accomplishment of the desired end. The plan proposed by the minority party is to throw our commercial doors wide open for the free importation of the products of foreign labor. Members of that party insist that if we do this we will necessarily have unrestricted access to the markets of other countries. They urge that if we will but allow Europe to clothe us, furnish our steel rails, our structural iron and everything else we produce, we will thus secure a most wonderful expansion of our trade. They insist that the way for us to capture the markets of the world is to throw our markets open to the world. The logic of the opinion is that if we do this we will have the products of other countries. 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
