



CHINA APPEALS FOR AID

SECRETARY HAY'S REPLY. Cannot Protest Against Russian Occupation at Present.

Washington, Nov. 2.—Sir Chentung Liang Cheng, the Chinese Minister here, acting under instructions from his government, has been particularly active recently in the effort to interest the United States Government in China's behalf in her Manchurian troubles.

It appears, however, that Secretary Hay has not been able to hit upon any plan of action that would promise to serve China in this manner.

Japan, it was learned to-night, has instituted a vigorous investigation regarding the extent and character of Russia's reoccupation of Moukden.

APFRAY AT CHEMULPO.

Russian and Japanese Bluejackets Fight—Several Injured.

London, Nov. 3.—The Tokio correspondent of "The Daily Mail" reports a serious affray at Chemulpo, Corea, between Russian bluejackets belonging to the gunboat Bohr and Japanese bluejackets from the cruiser Chiyoda and a number of Japanese residents of Chemulpo.

RUSSIANS LEAVE PORT.

Reoccupation of Moukden Causes Alarm in Tokio.

Yokohama, Nov. 2.—It is officially reported at Tokio from Wi-Ju, by way of Seoul, that the Russians are withdrawing from Yungampho, on the Yalu River, and dismantling their fortress there, leaving only a small guard.

Wyoming Sheriff's Posse Has Another Fight with Sioux.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 2.—According to a late report from Lusk, a second battle between the Sioux Indians and the Sheriff's posse was fought to-day on Horseshoe Creek, northeast of Lusk.

Governor Chatterton is investigating the late report, and if it is true, and the situation is as alarming as indicated, he will at once send troops into the field to suppress the Indians.

The Indians were led by Eagle Feather, alias Charley Smith, a full-blooded Sioux, who is a graduate of the Carlisle Indian School and formerly played on the Indian football team.

GAYNOR TO SIT AT CONEY ISLAND

UNPRECEDENTED ACTION TAKEN IN PREPARATION FOR EXPECTED TROUBLE WITH REPEATERS.

Superintendent Morgan Furnishes Police with Lists of All Who Have Registered Illegally—Charges Will Follow Failure to Arrest.

The fusionists last night were confident that Brooklyn would insure the re-election of Mayor Low. Tammany men, despite the bluff of betting, were discouraged.

The unprecedented action of ordering Justice Gaynor to sit in the Supreme Court at Coney Island to-day to hear election cases was taken by the Appellate Division in Brooklyn.

George W. Morgan, Superintendent of Elections, and Police Commissioner Greene furnished their deputies and policemen with full lists of all those who had registered illegally, and ordered them to arrest all who tried to vote on the names in the lists.

The fusionists were confident of victory on the eve of the election.

DOOLEY WAS DEFIANT. READY FOR REPEATERS.

Refused to Serve Summonses for Questionable Voters. Policemen to Have List of Those Illegally Registered.

Preparing for trouble that is expected at Coney Island to-day on account of the big fire of Sunday, which wiped out the voting residences of about five hundred men, the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, 112 Department, yesterday assigned Justice Gaynor to hold a special term of the Supreme Court there to-day.

The holding of a special term of the Supreme Court at Coney Island on Election Day is unprecedented. It was not done even during the McKane troubles in 1893, all cases arising in that crisis being brought downtown.

The fire on Sunday wiped out the buildings in the Thirty-sixth Election District of the VIII Assembly District, in the heart of Coney Island.

Deputy Maher asked Police Captain Dooley to serve the summonses, but he refused, on the ground that a State officer had no right to issue orders to him.

Attorney General Cunniff was communicated with by telephone, and by telegraph he appointed Mr. Yonge.

A committee of Democratic lawyers last night prepared a demand for every one of the five hundred voters. Every time one of the suspected voters is challenged a mandamus on his behalf will be presented to Justice Gaynor.
