





CRAM'S GONE TO EUROPE. WON'T HAVE TO TESTIFY.

TALK OF NEW CARDINAL.

Struggle at Rome Over Archbishop Ryan and Ireland.

Rome, Nov. 20.—A great struggle is going on to have an American cardinal chosen at the next Consistory. The two most prominent candidates are Archbishop Ryan, of Philadelphia, and Archbishop Ireland, of St. Paul.

Indeed, after Pius's ascension to the Pontificate the feeling against Archbishop Ireland was rather strong. Statements have been recently made, however, that the situation is beginning to change in his favor, there being a chance that he may be soon made cardinal.

TREE WRECKS AIRSHIP.

Lebaudy Brothers' Balloon Collapses—Occupants Escape.

Paris, Nov. 20.—The Lebaudy brothers' dirigible airship, which made the recent remarkable flight from Moisson to Paris, attaining a speed of nearly thirty miles an hour, met with a serious accident to-day. The airship ascended at 11:13 this morning from the Champ de Mars, a crowd of people witnessing its rise.

RESULT OF ROYAL VISIT.

Italy and Britain in Accord on Foreign Policies.

London, Nov. 20.—It is understood that as a result of the conference yesterday evening between the Italian Foreign Minister, Signor Tittoni, and Lord Lansdowne a complete agreement was reached between Great Britain and Italy on matters affecting their foreign policies.

C. SPRECKELS VERY SICK.

Doctors in Constant Attendance—Recently Had Paralysis.

San Francisco, Nov. 20.—Claus Spreckels, the sugar king, who is regarded as the richest man on this coast, is ill, and his age and the fact that he recently had a stroke of paralysis make his condition critical. Mr. Spreckels suffered a stroke of paralysis just after his return from a recent trip abroad, and it is rumored that his present illness is due to a second stroke.

CRUDE OIL UP FIVE CENTS A BARREL.

Advance Attributed to the Decrease in Production.

Pittsburg, Nov. 20.—The selling price of crude oil was advanced five cents a barrel to-day by the Standard and Independent pipe lines. The price quoted to-day is \$1.82, against \$1.77 yesterday.

OLD MAN SWEEP OVER FALLS.

Women Try to Rescue Him and Are Themselves Nearly Lost.

Toronto, Nov. 20.—Pushing out from Falls View in a small boat this morning to cross the Susquehanna river, which is in a flooded and dangerous condition, a man, thought to be Samuel Hoover, seventy years old, of City, was drowned by having his boat carried over the falls.

MANY MILLS REOPEN.

Six Thousand Men in Monongahela Valley Going Back to Work.

Pittsburg, Nov. 20.—Over six thousand men, including iron, steel, tin and wood workers, of the Monongahela Valley towns will resume work next week. Many of them have been idle for a month or two, while others have been from ten days to two weeks out of work.

The independent plant of the McKeesport Tin Plate Company, where the hot mills, employing six hundred men, closed down a week ago, will reopen on Monday morning, and at Clairton an additional blast furnace and the 40-inch steel mill of the Clairton Steel Company, employing about four hundred and fifty men, will reopen on Sunday night.

BABY IN "SAMMY" BOX.

Makes Presence Known in Dark Scene in "Babes in Toyland."

Another babe was added last night to "Babes in Toyland," the attraction, fittingly it would seem, at the Majestic Theatre. The addition, however, was without the knowledge or consent of the audience, and was not known to actors or audience until the end of a dark scene in the first act.

JALOUS OF THE CAT CLUB.

Stamford Poultry Association Remembers Last Year—President May Resign.

Stamford, Conn., Nov. 20.—Horace Havemeyer, son of H. O. Havemeyer, threatens to resign as president of the Stamford Poultry Association. There is trouble over letting the Connecticut Cat Club having space for its exhibit at the forthcoming show in the armory. It was made known last evening that the cat club could not have the same space as last year, and would have to take what was left after the poultry exhibits were disposed of.

REWARD FOR ARRESTING DRUNKARDS.

A Woman in Norfolk Suggests a Way to Be Rid of a Nuisance.

Stamford, Conn., Nov. 20.—A novel plan has been suggested to get rid of drunkards in Norfolk. They are in the habit of making insulting remarks, particularly to women. One woman, who has had experience with them, has suggested to the Village Improvement Society that a remedy might be found in offering rewards to officers who arrest the drinkers. The society has adopted the suggestion.

NOBILITY IN RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

Several Killed and Injured in Portugal—The Duchess of Palmella Hurt.

London, Nov. 21.—"The Daily Mail's" Lisbon correspondent says that several persons were killed and many others belonging to noble families, including the Duchess of Palmella, chief lady in waiting of the Queen's bedchamber, were severely injured in a railway accident on the Cascaes line, thirty-five miles from Lisbon.

THANKSGIVING DINNER.

Will Start for Omaha To-day to Face Charges Against Him.

Washington, Nov. 20.—United States Senator Charles H. Dietrich will start for Omaha to-morrow morning to surrender to the authorities in that city, because of his indictment on a charge of conspiracy in connection with postoffice patronage. Senator Dietrich reiterated to-night the assertion that he would demand an immediate hearing.

CONCILIATORS GET \$50 AN HOUR.

Tamaqua, Penn., Nov. 20.—While the miners' representatives on the conciliation board are serving without compensation, the operators' representatives are being well paid. For the last year each of the three representatives of the coal companies will receive \$5,000. This is about at the rate of \$50 an hour for the time the board was in session.

GERARD MAY HEAD POLICE.

His Selection Part of Tammany Effort To Be God.

James W. Gerard, Charles F. Murphy's personal friend, a wealthy Democratic lawyer, living in the XVIIIth Assembly District (Murphy), and chairman of the finance committee of Tammany Hall, is seriously considered for Police Commissioner by Mr. McClellan and Charles F. Murphy. A member of the Tammany executive committee, in speaking of prospective appointments by Mr. McClellan, said to a Tribune reporter yesterday:

Colonel McClellan and certain national Democrats have talked Murphy into trying a new experiment in Tammany politics. Murphy, it is said, for the next year will try to run the organization without permitting anything having the semblance of "grafting." The Police Department is the most important of all the branches of the municipal administration.

SAN DOMINGO RESISTS.

French Cruiser Lands Marines—No Damage in the City.

San Domingo, Nov. 19.—The French cruiser Jurien de la Gravière arrived here to-day, and landed guards for the protection of the consulate. Severe fighting has begun. The insurgents are bombarding the town, and their attack is being vigorously resisted by the forts. No injury has so far been done. The United States cruiser Baltimore will be compelled to leave here on Saturday, and another American warship is anxiously expected. Fighting continues to the south, but the results so far as known are favorable to the government.

REBEL FORCES BROKEN.

Jimenez's Followers Turning Against Him—Several Conflicts.

Cape Havien, Nov. 20.—A rumor is current here that the people in the south of the republic, who were in favor of Jimenez, have parted against him. Several engagements between government troops and insurgents have taken place.

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COLOMBIA ENVOYS FAIL.

REYES' THREAT OF WAR. GOING TO WASHINGTON.

Colombia to Await Negotiations—Mr. Beaupre Safe.

Colon, Nov. 20.—General Reyes, the distinguished Colombian soldier, who came to the isthmus on a peace mission representing his government, said to-night: The day I left Bogota, which was on November 11, the United States Minister, Mr. Beaupre, and the secretary of legation, Mr. Snyder, well, though a little anxious, I assured your minister that he was in no danger, and I am today able to give the same assurance to the Associated Press. At the time I left Bogota Mr. Beaupre was preparing to do down the river.

ISTHMIAN SOVEREIGNTY.

Text of First Five Articles of the New Treaty.

Washington, Nov. 20.—The text of the first five articles of the Panama Canal Treaty, which relate to the question of sovereignty, is as follows: Article I.—The United States guarantees and will maintain the independence of the Republic of Panama.

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
