## HUNTINGTON BUYS TELEPHONES.

Gets Control of Thirteen More Exchanges in Texas—Has Paid \$1,000,000.

San Antonio, Tex., March 5.—E. H. Huntington has just closed a deal through Frank C. Smith whereby he becomes owner of thirteen additional independent telephone exchanges in Texas. The new exchanges just purchased are the Austin, Taylor, Temple, Belton, Sour Lake, Saratoga, Kountze, Woodville, Village, Kirbyville, Coil, Jasper and Bronson, and the long distance lines of the Commercial and Long Star companies. To complete the deal, Huntington has also purchased the Houston, Galveston, Corsicana, Nacogdoches, San Marcos, Fort Arthur and Liberty exchanges, previously acquired, exceeds \$1,000,000.

## RECORD RUN BY GEORGE J. GOULD.

San Francisco, March 5.—According to advices received at Southern Pacific headquarters, George J. Gould and his party, on a special train, made record time on an inspection run to-day over the Lucin cut-off. Their train arrived at Ogden about noon, having made 104 miles in 3 hours and 58 minutes, including all delays incidental to seeing the track and filling.

## MORE GOLD IS TO BE EXPORTED.

Heidelbach, Ickelheimer & Co., it was announced yesterday, have arranged to export \$200,000 gold to Argentina by the steamer Castila, sailing on Wednesday. This brings the total engagements in the current movement up to \$2,500,000, as \$1,300,000 gold is to go on the Egyptian Prince, which will leave New-York for Buenos Ayres to-morrow.

## POWDER CONSOLIDATION.

San Francisco, March 5.—The E. I. Dupont Company is completing its absorption of the California Vigorite Company at a cost of \$200,000 and the three manufacturing fuse companies on this coast, which has already absorbed the California Powder Works and the Judson Dynamite Company. To complete an absolute monopoly on the coast, the Dupont people need the Giant Powder Company, and are now quietly seeking its possession. The three fuse companies just taken over by the Dupont company are said to have been at a high price.

## CRASH HURTS FOUR BADLY

### FIRE TRUCK HITS CAR.

#### Motorman of Latter Loses His Head and Jumps Off.

Four firemen were badly hurt and several others narrowly escaped injury last evening in a collision at Lexington-ave. and Twenty-eighth-st. between Truck 7 and a Lexington-ave. trolley car. Lieutenant James J. Convey

and Fireman Thomas Callan, who were hurt worst, are now in Bellevue Hospital, one with two ribs on his right side fractured, and his whole body a mass of bruises, and the other with three fingers of his right hand nearly severed and many contusions. Fireman Louis Slickman and Dennis Murphy received numerous cuts and bruises, none serious. That the whole crew of the truck was not killed or maimed was remarkable. The firemen agree that the accident would have been prevented had the motorman of the car, Dominick Galgano, of No. 165 Elizabeth-st., kept his head when he saw the truck approaching.

The truck was responding to an alarm. Turning out from the house, in West Twenty-eighth-st., near Third-ave., the driver, Nicholas George, sent his three powerful horses, with the eight-ton truck, to Lexington-ave., where he swung north. Coming south on the west track was the car. According to the rules, the car should have stopped on the west side, and George therefore sent his horses, without relaxing their speed, straight up the avenue. The car was coming fast, and when the motorman saw that a collision was inevitable he shut off his power, unfastened the gate and leaped off the car.
