

CALLED LIAR BY GRADY.

MANY CHARGES OF FRAUD.

State Committee Boils with Various Kinds of Inveective.

Albany, April 18.—Politicians stirred early this morning, and the headquarters of Tammany, of David B. Hill and of W. R. Hearst were busy spots by 8 o'clock. So far as could be learned at an early hour there had been no change in the situation, and the Tammany leaders said that they were quite content to go on the floor of the convention and state their case.

It was said that Mr. Murphy, of Tammany, had this morning offered to compromise by suggesting that Tammany would agree to the adoption of the unit rule if the name of a candidate, as, for instance, Judge Parker, was not mentioned. It was contended that, there being almost two-thirds of the delegates in favor of Judge Parker, a mere adoption of the unit rule would practically be an endorsement of Judge Parker, and yet would let Tammany down gracefully.

But with this proposition was coupled the demand that to Tammany should be allowed a delegate-at-large, Mr. Murphy, himself, preferably. To this suggestion Senator Hill gave an emphatic no. The name of Judge Parker must be mentioned in the resolutions, and the delegates-at-large must be men who are hearty in his favor, and whose loyalty to his candidacy cannot be questioned.

With this early morning failure of negotiations for peace the preparations for battle went on. In Senator Hill's headquarters, while a lot of business was going on, everything was serene. Mr. Hill, himself in excellent humor, was asked what the situation was, and answered: "More than two-thirds of the convention are for Judge Parker. That is all I care to say."

COMMITTEE LATE IN GATHERING.

The first meeting of the day was that of the State committee, scheduled to take place at 9 o'clock. So arduous had been the labors of the night before that it was after 10 o'clock when the committee got a quorum together. There were several substitutes in the committee, T. H. Farrell representing the Hill district, in place of Hugh McLaughlin, and T. H. Lee the XXIII, in place of Michael McCabe; Victor Dowling, in place of Daniel Finn; Thomas F. Grady, in place of P. H. Keahan; C. H. Harvey, vice James Purcell; M. F. Dillon, vice J. H. Glavin; W. F. Rafferty, vice P. E. McCabe.

W. F. Balkam, of Rochester, presented the name of George Raines, of that city, as the candidate for temporary chairman, and it was unanimously adopted. Elliot Danforth handed up the names of John A. Mason, W. F. Kearney, F. A. Willard, Daniel Frieble, Charles E. Norris and Reuben R. Lyon as secretaries. Senator Grady called attention to the fact that New York was not represented, and on his motion Thomas F. Smith was added, as was also D. J. Sweeney, of Erie, and the list was approved.

When the roll of delegates was about to be called Senator Grady moved that all the contests be noted. The secretary said he had no notice of any contest, and Chairman Campbell said that it was the custom to make up the roll of delegates from the lists presented by the various State committees.

To this Senator Grady objected. He said it was due the committee that it should know that the roll to be called was not perfect and that there were contests. "I call attention to the case of Committeeman Dowd, of Allegany, who went over into Cattaraugus and made himself secretary of a convention to which he was not a delegate. Then, later, he certified to the list of delegates."

Mr. Dowd said: "The Senator mistakes. No such thing was done. I don't know of any contest."

GRADY AND DOWD IN MAD FIGHT. "Why, you offered last night to pay a contesting delegate's fare back home if he would leave," said Senator Grady.

Finally the Chair ruled that contests would only be noted when filed with the committee, saying: "Why, Senator Grady, you don't think that you have the right to notice contests in Cattaraugus and Chautauqua?"

"Certainly I have," answered Senator Grady, "when fraud is being done."

Later, when Cattaraugus was reached, Senator Grady called "contest," and Mr. Dowd, again by noting a contest in Senator Grady's district. Mr. Grady jumped to his feet, and putting his finger in Dowd's face, shouted: "Don't be here like you do to your own constituents at home."

"I am not lying. I have as much right to protest as you have," answered Dowd. "You do lie, and last night you tried to bribe a delegate to leave his home, afraid he would expose you," said Grady.

The Chair ruled again that contests not filed would not be recognized, but the turmoil broke out again when the Onondaga delegates were called. State Committeeman Dunfee declared that the names he had handed in were not on the list, and accused the officers of the committee of playing fast and loose. A protest was made by a group of men from Saratoga, objecting, saying that Mr. Dunfee's delegates were not legal and the counts had not been declared. He was sustained by Senator McCarrren and opposed by Senator Grady. Mr. Dunfee replied in heated terms, calling his opponents "liars, thieves and sneaks."

SAYS DEMOCRATS DEFEAT PARTY.

The Chair finally ruled that Mr. Dunfee's delegates must go on the roll, and then Senator McCarrren moved to substitute the names handed in by Mr. Dillon. Senator Grady then said, with much warmth:

"It is perfectly apparent that there is an attempt to prove to the public that in control of the committee are in perfect unanimity, and to disconcert the minds of the voters by the presence of the minority (Tammany Hall). You have marked these men for removal, you are about to instruct the Democracy, now a strong Republican county. Why? Because you threw out some years ago a proper Democratic representation. It is in your hands to make a strong Republicanism the defeat of the party. I come from a Democratic district, and yet you let Mr. Dowd, of Republican Cattaraugus and Allegany, have more say than you, Dunfee, of Syracuse, don't knock down to the present powers, and so he must go. Don't let it go out that this is a manipulated convention, and that we are forced to do the wishes of a man who carries the votes in his pocket."

Senator McCarrren withdrew his motion, and the delegates named by Mr. Dunfee went on the temporary roll. The roll was approved as read, the Walsh men from Westchester going on, and the meeting adjourned.
