tenant Colonel John D. Emmet will be instructor, with Captain John R. Foley as adjutant; Companies D and E, on May 10, 26 and June 9, Major Michael Lynch instructor, and Lieutenant W. J. Captain John Anderson, regimental adjutant of the 14th Regiment, has applied for a twenty-year long service medal. Captain Anderson served some time in the 2d as an enlisted man.

The officers of the regiments going to Peekskill in June will wear the olive drab uniforms, and regulations are being put in for them now by those officers who are not yet supplied. Whether the men will receive them in time to wear them at the State camp is not yet determined.

John W. Creighton has received the nomination as second lieutenant in Company F, 14th Regiment. He served as a second lieutenant in the Spanish-American War.

Company F, 4th Regiment, has gone to the Naval Militia for a first lieutenant, electing En-

sign Philip G. Hoyt, from the first division of the 2d Naval Battalion.

The 1st Regiment will parade for divine service this afternoon at the Second Collegiate Church, One-hundred-and-twenty-third, and Lexington-avenue, where Chaplain Edgar Thron, Jr., will preach the sermon. The regiment will go and return by the elevated road.

The 1st Naval Battalion will go to Creedmoor for rifle practice on Saturday, June 4. The divisions now drill each evening in the East River in the handling of cutters. The Fourth Division has elected William S. Montgomery lieutenant. He is a graduate of the Naval Academy, and resigned from the navy as a lieutenant in 1901. He served on the United States ship Petrel in 1898, in the battle of Manila Bay.

The annual inspection of the First Signal Corps will be held at Van Cortlandt Park on Saturday, by Major F. T. Leigh, chief signal officer.

Company D, of the 9th Regiment, has won the team of ten match, shot in the army rifle range in December to April. Its score in the aggregate was 1,875 points. The scores of the other companies were: H, 1,747; A, 1,723; B, 1,722; F, 1,654; K, 1,635; C, 1,625; I, 1,541; G, 1,422; and E, 1,413.

DEMAND A JEROME-AVE. SUBWAY. Much disappointment is being expressed in the Borough of the Bronx over the fact that the report of the Rapid Transit Commission's committee on plan and scope makes no reference to a subway line up Jerome-ave. For years such a line had been advocated by the North Side Board of Trade and other organizations, the necessity for some provision for the westerly section of The

Bronx being generally conceded. Concerning this President Albert E. Davis of the North Side Board of Trade said yesterday:

In recognition of the importance of the Jerome-ave. line, a proposition was advanced by Mr. Parsons in April, 1901, for the substitution of a bridge for a tunnel at One-hundred-and-forty-fifth-st. and the Harlem River, which it was stated would effect a saving of \$1,000,000, and which amount it was proposed to construct at once a line up Jerome-ave. Opposition from East Siders who thought it better to look at and see what they could do. The plan was taken as an indication that some common look in at least and see what they could do. The sales reached a total of only 80,000 pieces, but they were disposed of for the same price as that of last week, so there was not the weakening tendency that some expected as a result of the eagerness of some treasure-seekers to demand for goods.

There was an encouraging outlook for goods of medium width and there was no request for a cut in the quotation for them. This was rather surprising, and some of the mill men are now hopeful enough to predict that the figure for cotton yarns will be in the market in large numbers ready to meet the price that the figure for cotton yarns and the manufacturers in demanding. The curtailment plan is in operation, but no effects are visible as yet. It may be extended, for some of the mills find that two days a week is not enough for them. A few that are not well supplied with cotton yarn close down entirely for two weeks or more. The mills that have a large supply and fairly good contracts are running full time, and if they find it curtail they have made no announcement of it. The market remains firm at the same prices as last week.
