

NEW TEST FOR "AUTOS."

Cup Candidates To Be Tried Thursday at Empire City Track.

The board of governors of the Automobile Club of America met yesterday, and decided on the organization of its racing board to hold another test of the Winton, Peerless and Christie cars, the candidates for the international cup race to be run in Germany on June 7. The test will be held in private next Thursday at the Empire City track.

The vehicles will go a distance of two hundred miles, and after each thirty miles there will be a stop of a third of a mile, when the cars will travel at a speed of between three and five minutes. The full board of governors was present at yesterday's meeting, besides L. F. Moore, the owner of the Peerless, Walter Christie, and "Barney" Oldfield, the driver of the Winton.

All three were much pleased with the decision and promised to have the defects shown in the former trials remedied.
