

HARVARD GETS REVENGE.

SHUTS OUT YALE NINE.

McKay Weakens and Crimson Wins, 5 to 0.

Harvard supporters received some consolation at the Polo Grounds yesterday for their defeat in the varsity boat race on Friday by the Yale crew. For in the Yale-Harvard baseball game the wearers of the crimson carried off the honors with as much glory as the sons of Old Ed did on the water on the previous day. The Harvard players shut out their opponents by a score of 5 to 0.

The victory was a decisive one, for the Crimson outplayed the Blue at all points of the game, taking the lead in the opening inning and increasing it to the fourth, after which no scoring was done. Yale was a slight favorite in the betting before the game, principally because McKay, who pitched such a good game last Tuesday, when the Yale nine defeated Harvard by a score of 6 to 1, was to be in the box. Coburn, who also pitched in the preceding game, was again in the box for Harvard. Much regret was expressed by the Crimson contingent that Clarkson, the Harvard pitcher who recently signed with the New-York American nine and who played his first game yesterday, losing by a close score, could not pitch for his college, but double was the joy at the end over the excellent showing Coburn made.

The game was somewhat drawn out, but there were several brilliant plays that made up for this. The chief credit for the victory should be bestowed on Randall, Matthews, the clever codd shortstop, and Coburn. Randall, besides fielding brilliantly, with the exception of one error, carried off the batting honors. Only once did he fail to hit the ball in his four times at the bat, and his home run hit, that went under the ropes in left field in the opening inning, took some of the starch out of the Yale players. Matthews also distinguished himself at the bat, making three safe hits. Singularly enough, he was the only player besides Randall on his side who had an error credited to him.

Coburn pitched superbly, having full control of the ball throughout the game. Besides, he fielded his position brilliantly and allowed only one base on balls. The work of McKay, on the contrary, was a sad disappointment from the start. He was wild and was hit freely. The fielding of a few of the Yale players was faulty, especially that of O'Brien. The latter's poor throw to first in the third inning, after Randall and Carr had been retired, gave Stephenson a chance, by a fine sprint, to get to third on a single by Matthews. Then, to make matters worse, O'Brien made a miff of Fischer's high fly to short center, and Stephenson and Matthews crossed the plate.

The game was set for 10:30 o'clock, and was started on time. Evidently the early hour had its effect on the attendance, as only about five thousand were present. The Yale followers occupied the seats on the right of the grandstand, while the Harvard undergraduates and enthusiasts sat on the left. The enthusiasm was far behind that shown at the Yale and Princeton game in this city two weeks ago. It was not until the fifth inning that the Yale rooters began their "rahs," and not until the seventh that the "Boola-Boola" was sung. The Harvard contingent was also reserved in their rooting. Clarkson sat on the Harvard bench and was surrounded by his college mates. At the end of the game a large number of Harvard students accompanied him to the baseball grounds of the American League.

HOW THE GAME WAS PLAYED.

Yale was first at the bat, and O'Brien, Hulskamp and Miller, the first three batters up, were retired in one, two, three order. Randall was first up for Harvard, and drove the ball under the right field ropes for a home run. Carr got his base by being hit by a pitched ball, and Stephenson was retired on Hulskamp's throw to Chittenden, allowing Carr to get third on the play. Matthews fled to Winslow and Carr scored on the throw in. Fischer singled over second, and McCarthy was third to go out.

It looked as though the second inning would be a duplicate, for Yale's first two batters were fielded out. But then Barnes gave hopes by sending out what turned out to be the only two base hit made in the game. Winslow singled to right, but Barnes was caught at the plate on Greenough's throw in. The Crimson's first three batters were retired in one, two, three order in their half of this inning.

With Chittenden out in the third, McKay got his base on balls, but was caught napping. O'Brien was struck out. Then the Cambridge players went to the bat, and increased their lead by making two more runs. With Randall and Carr out, Stephenson was safe on O'Brien's bad throw. Matthews singled to right, advancing Stephenson to third. Then Fischer's fly was muffed by O'Brien, and Stephenson and Matthews scored. McCarthy was put out, ending further talking.

Nothing striking happened on the Yale side in the fifth, but the Harvard men increased their lead with one more run. Greenough got his base on balls. Coburn followed with a fly. Kernan bunted and was safe on McKay's bad throw to first. Randall singled to right and Greenough got home. On the throw in Randall was put out at second, Kernan, however, reaching third. Carr ended Yale's agony by reaching struck out.

A fast bit of playing was indulged in in the fifth by the Harvard players. Barnes first up for Yale, got his base by being hit by a pitched ball. Winslow then sent a grounder to Randall and the latter put the ball with lightning speed to Matthews, doubling on Barnes. Chittenden was safe on Matthews' wild throw. The error did not turn out seriously, as McKay, who followed, was retired. It looked as though Harvard would swell its lead in this inning, for, with Stephenson out, Matthews and Fischer singled. Matthews was so anxious, however, and was caught trying to steal third. McCarthy got his base on balls, but Greenough's high fly was nicely handled by O'Brien.

It seemed as though the Yale players would get a man over the plate in the sixth, when, with two men out, Miller and Cote singled. Bowman, who followed, however, was felled out. Again, in the seventh, Old Ed's batters were retired in one, two, three order. Miller, whose stock work was the feature of the eighth, after his side had been hastily retired, had Greenough's first in a hundred for Yale. Carr singled to center, but Miller's fast return of the ball enabled Hulskamp to retire Greenough at third. In spite of the fact that there did not seem one chance in a hundred for Yale to do anything in the ninth, few of their supporters left the stand until the first three men were put out, one after another. It was unnecessary for the Cambridge team to play its half in this inning. The score:



The sixteenth annual veterans' invitation century run was held at the Century Run Club Association, which started the veterans' runs in 1890, will be captain and Daniel M.
